PV HAPPENINGS

Clean up Yard Waste

Time to rake those leaves! While the colors of the changing trees are beautiful, keeping your yard clean during this time of year can be a nuisance. Fortunately, the City of Prairie Village and Deffenbaugh try to make this autumn task a little bit easier.

During the month of November, residents are allowed to set out 12 yard waste items per week for collection by Deffenbaugh. Please place yard waste in biodegradable paper bags or rigid containers no larger than 35 gallons. Bundles of twigs and branches no larger than 4 feet in length and 18 inches in circumference are also permitted. Extra containers and bags may be set out, but require an overflow sticker at a cost of \$1.25 per item.




2015 Revenue Sources - All Funds

Sales Tax Rate by Entity



Property Tax: Tax on real estate and personal property. It is computed by applying the City’s mill rate to the County’s assessed valuation.

Sales Tax: Tax comes from two sources: Local Sales Tax and County Sales Tax.

Franchise Fees: Franchise fees are charged on major utilities within the City. The fee is 5% of gross receipts as defined and permitted by state statutes.

Charges for Services: Includes revenue which is a charge for contract services and special assessments to recipients of certain services.

Intergovernmental: Includes revenues provided by other jurisdictions, primarily the State and Federal governments.

Other Revenues: Includes use tax, motor vehicle tax, liquor tax, license & permits, recreation fees, fines, interest income and miscellaneous revenue.

How are your property taxes used?




Your property tax bill is divided between several entities of which the City is only 17%

How is the mill levy used?

The mill levy rate is applied to the assessed valuation for your property.

The 2015 budget does not include a mill levy rate increase. The mill levy rate was last increased in 2012 by 0.6 mills.





Capital Infrastructure Program

The City maintains a four-year **Capital Infrastructure Program (CIP)** to aid the City Council and staff in planning and budgeting for the City's infrastructure needs. The CIP is reviewed and updated each year during the budget process. The majority of the funding for the CIP comes from the General Fund. Other funding sources include bond proceeds, the gas tax, the stormwater utility fee, grants, participation by neighboring cities and 1/3 of the liquor tax which is required to be spent on parks and recreation programs.



The CIP is divided into five sections:


Parks: Includes plans for redevelopment and replacement of existing park structures and materials.

Drainage: Includes plans for replacement of components of the City's storm drainage system.

Streets: Includes plans for major improvements that extend the life of the City's street system.

Buildings: Includes plans for replacement or major improvements that extend the life of the City's buildings.

Sidewalks & Curbs: Includes plans for replacement or major improvements that extend the life of the City's sidewalk and curb system. Also includes plans for additions to the system to comply with the City's sidewalk policy or ADA regulations.



PROJECT UPDATES

Prairie Village Disc Golf Course Now Open in Santa Fe Trail Park

A disc golf course is now open in Prairie Village at Santa Fe Trail Park (7727 Delmar), adding to the list of amenities offered by the Prairie Village parks system. Disc golf is played in a similar fashion to traditional golf; however, players throw a Frisbee or disc at a target rather than hit a ball with a club.

Featuring 9 “holes” winding throughout the park, the course is designed to attract players of all skill levels. Each hole features concrete tee pads with signage outlining the course.

Emerald Ash Borer

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) issue is one that the City of Prairie Village has been tracking for several years and now, with it being found in nearby Roeland Park, it is time to begin a multi-year process to manage the issue. Prairie Village has an estimated 700 ash trees located on City owned islands, parks, and street right-of-ways. Unfortunately the EAB will kill all the ash trees in the not too distant future based on other cities experience where the EAB infestation has taken place. The City of Prairie Village began removing and replacing ash trees in the fall of 2014 and will to continue to address the issue for the next several years. The majority of the removed ash trees were less than 12 inches in diameter, or already in poor condition.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Don't be an Out-of-Town Victim

With the holiday travel season soon approaching, the Police Department wants you to be aware of some hotel scams that have occurred across the country over the last few years. Nothing spoils a trip more than a compromised credit card.

Phony Restaurant Flyers

Many budget-conscious travelers will opt for ordering from a nearby restaurant -- grabbing the first menu they see wedged in their door. The problem is that some of these flyers are not restaurants at all. When you place your order and provide your credit card over the phone, your meal will not arrive and your credit card number may be used for fraudulent charges. Do yourself a favor, either spend a little more money and order room service, or take some time and research the restaurant online to make sure it is an actual business.

Fake Wi-Fi

Free Wi-Fi is great, but just make sure when you access a network, it is legitimate. The network may be labeled "Free Hotel Wi-Fi" but it could be a cyber thief who is nearby waiting to grab your personal information. To avoid this scam, confirm with the hotel the correct Wi-Fi network name.

Phone Phishing

You check into the hotel and hours later you receive a phone call from a person posing as hotel staff from the front desk. The person makes a statement that the hotel computer systems are down and they need to run your credit card again. The problem is the caller is only posing as an employee at the front desk and you have just provided a criminal with your credit card information. In these instances, tell the caller you will contact the front desk in person and hang up. Most hotels are aware of this scam and have put countermeasures into place by not transferring a call into a room unless the caller knows the name and room number. Do not become a victim to this scam; contact the front desk in person to clear up any issues and report any suspicious phone calls to hotel staff.



Winter Crime Prevention Tips

Wintertime presents some new challenges to protect yourself and your property. Here are several tips to keep you safe this season.

- Keep presents away from windows and keep your blinds closed so no one can see the presents in your home.
- Lock your doors and windows at all times even if you are away for only a few minutes.
- Do not open the door to anyone you do not know and trust.
- Use security lights to help light the outside and warn away intruders. Use lights on a timer to make it appear someone is home at night.
- When vacationing, hold the newspaper, mail and any other regular deliveries to your home.
- Set timers on lights, radios, or TVs to give the appearance that someone is home.
- Sign up for a house watch on your residence at www.pvkansas.com.
- Do not post your travel plans on social networking sites like Facebook, MySpace, or Twitter.
- Ask a neighbor to make tire tracks in the driveway when it snows to give the appearance someone is home.
- When shopping, do not leave your handbag or wallet unattended or in the shopping cart; it can be stolen very quickly.
- Pay attention when walking in parking lots, especially when talking on your cell phone, and walk facing traffic.
- Keep valuable items out of sight in your vehicle, put them in the trunk or hidden under a seat. Do not leave any trace of navigation systems like cords, cradles, and ring marks.
- When you take the trash out after the holidays, avoid taking product boxes out to the curb. Leaving a TV, Wii, computer, or laptop box on the curb tells everyone who drives by what there is to steal in your home.

Village teams (those with a majority of players who are Prairie Village residents or attend school in Prairie Village) will be given priority for field reservations, but any team may apply to reserve a field. Teams can reserve two practice times per week for up to 1 ½ hours. Fields are available in Porter, Franklin, Windsor, and Taliaferro Parks. If your team reserved a field in 2014, your coach should receive a 2015 application form soon. You may also obtain one at the Municipal Offices or online at www.pvkansas.com under Leisure & Lifestyle>>Recreation Programs. Applications for the spring season are due January 15th.

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A Brush With Kindness

The season of giving arrived early this year in Prairie Village as volunteers spent several October days rehabilitating the exterior of a resident's home through a partnership between the Prairie Village Municipal Foundation, the Prairie Village Codes Enforcement Department, and Heartland Habitat for Humanity.

"A Brush with Kindness" is an exterior home assistance program that offers services to those Prairie Village residents who are unable to maintain their property due to physical or financial issues. Specifically, it helps residents correct code violations and revitalize the exterior of their homes and property. Applications for assistance are submitted to and approved by Heartland Habitat, and fully funded by the Municipal Foundation.

"Rather than issue tickets for codes violations, we offer a helping hand to our community members in need," Marcia Gradinger, Code Enforcement Officer said. "This is a hand up, not a hand out, and benefits both the homeowners and neighborhoods as a whole."

Ruth Forman has lived in Prairie Village for 18 years. On October 3 and 8, volunteers from Mariner Holdings and Church of the Resurrection joined Marcia Gradinger to repair a crumbling porch and paint Forman's home. "Without this program, Marcia, and the volunteers, I would not have been able to make these improvements." Forman said. "This was a wonderful experience and truly about the person, not the property. I cried tears of joy and gratitude!"

Funds for "A Brush with Kindness" in Prairie Village are raised through Prairie Village Municipal Foundation events, including the Mayor's Holiday Tree Lighting and JazzFest. We extend our gratitude to those citizens who support the events that in turn support fellow citizens.
