Snow and Ice Removal

The variety of winter storms and weather extremes create a special challenge to Public Works employees who strive to keep your streets usable in the winter months.

With winter approaching, Public Works is prepared for the ritual of removing snow and ice from city streets. All personnel have received refresher training on equipment and procedures. Procedures and practices for plowing and salting have been reviewed and updated. The barn is stocked with 2,000 tons of salt and ready for winter.

When a winter storm is forecast, Public Works staff develops an operation plan considering time of day, type of weather, temperature, wind, length of storm, etc. Crews are generally scheduled to work in 12 hour shifts to clear streets.

The work priorities are:

- 樂 Maintain bare pavement on arterial streets
- Maintain bare pavement on collector streets
- * Maintain public building sidewalks
- * Plow or salt one lane on residential streets
- 業 Maintain sidewalks and parking lots in the parks.

The City does not remove ice or snow from private property. Property owners are responsible for removing ice and snow from the sidewalks abutting their property within 24 hours from the time that the snow or ice storm ends. If the snow falls or ice accumulates upon the sidewalks in the night time, removal of it must be within 24 hours after sunrise.

Snow removed from private property may not be placed in the street or on the sidewalk. If you hire someone to clear your driveway and sidewalks, inform them of this City ordinance requirement. As the property owner, you are responsible for the conduct of the hired company.

Stormwater Guidelines

The City Council recently adopted an ordinance which establishes requirements relating to stormwater pollution prevention. The Council passed this ordinance to prevent hazardous and harmful pollutants from entering the stormwater system. These pollutants can damage drinking water, streams, lakes, rivers and wetlands. The entire ordinance is included in Chapter 13, Article 9 of the Municipal Code and is available online at www.pvkansas.com/citygov/Mun_Code.shtml. Below is a list of a few common substances.

Not a violation of Ordinance:

- 1. Discharges from potable water sources
- 2. Individual Residential Car Washing
- 3. De-chlorinated swimming pool discharges excluding filter backwash you must wait for your swimming pool water to free of chemicals (= 0.0 ppm) before draining your pool
- 4. Foundation drains
- 5. Air conditioning condensate

Prohibited substances: These substances cannot be dumped in streets, gutters, catch basins, etc.

- 1. Any petroleum product or oil
- 2. Any hazardous substance or waste
- 3. Any garbage, rubbish, or other waste
- 4. Any new or used paints, including latex-based paints, oil-based paints, stains, varnish, and primers, as well as cleaning solvents and other associated products
- 5. Any yard wastes, which have been moved or gathered by a person
- 6. Any wastewater from commercial floor, rug, or carpet cleaning
- 7. Any runoff, wash-down water or waste from any animal pen, kennel, fowl or livestock containment area or any pet wastes
- 8. Any filter backwash from a swimming pool or fountain, except that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as to require the alteration of the filter discharge plumbing of an existing swimming pool, fountain or spa if such plumbing was compliant with applicable state, federal, and local regulations at the time of construction
- 9. Any waste from a carwash or commercial vehicle repair facility



Holiday Safety Awareness

With the changing season now in full swing, thoughts of pumpkin pie and the sugar plum fairies are not too far away. The cooler weather will bring more residents indoors as some people prepare their homes for winter and the holidays.

As a reminder, this month's newsletter addresses home security and suggests residents perform a residential security survey of their homes. A residential security survey involves simply looking for weak entry points into your home which a potential burglar may use to gain access into your home.

Listed below are some security suggestions to consider as you prepare your home for the winter.

- Relative All outside doors should be made of solid wood or metal construction.
- Replace worn out window hardware such as latches, locks, screws and pins.
- All outside doors and inside garage doors should have securely mounted deadbolt locks with a minimum one inch deadbolt.
- Strike plates should be affixed to the door frame with a minimum of two fully threaded three inch screws.
- All points of entry into your home should be properly illuminated and clear of obstructions.
- Try to keep valuables out of sight from the windows.
- Let a trusted neighbor know if you are going out of town so they can keep an eye on your home.

As you prepare your home to keep out the cold, also prepare your home to keep out potential burglars this holiday season. Do not hesitate to dial 911 if you see any suspicious activity.
