## MAYOR'S MESSAGE



Dear Prairie Village Residents,

I am pleased to announce that the governing body adopted the 2019 budget at the August 6 City Council meeting. The approved budget maintains the current mill levy rate while providing the same high quality services for which Prairie Village has come to be known. The

adopted budget allows for the addition of a full time employee in our building codes department, as demands on the department continue to increase.

As you have all heard by now, the City Council has been working to develop tighter building and residential remodeling guidelines to help protect our Village character while balancing the changing demographics and needs of the Prairie Village community. Following multiple open house meetings this summer, 625 completed surveys, and discussion by the governing body, the proposed Phase 2 guidelines will be presented at a public hearing in September and will hopefully go into effect January 1. Please see page 11 for more details.

As the City continues to focus on preserving and maintaining our island statuary, we have an opportunity for residents to volunteer with this effort. Later this summer, Paul Benson, a Prairie Village resident and a former Conservator of Objects at the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, will teach a course to residents who would like to assist in cleaning our statuary. I hope everyone had a fantastic summer enjoying all that our wonderful community has to offer. Thanks to countless volunteers, VillageFest was a huge success! 

# **PUBLIC SAFETY** 1

## **Auto Burglary Awareness**

Prairie Village is undoubtedly a safe place to live, work and shop. This city consistently ranks among the safest in the state, and our violent crime rate is significantly lower than the national average. That being said, just like everywhere else, property crimes are still prevalent. Prairie Village, as well as surrounding cities, has recently experienced an increase in auto burglaries, particularly during the overnight hours.

From January 1 to July 31 of this year, we recorded 65 auto burglary reports. That does not include roughly the same number (or more) reported by victims who wanted to make the Police Department aware of the activity, but did not desire a report due to little or no loss. In the same time frame, we had 11 vehicles stolen, most of which resulted from a burglar finding the keys inside.

The increase in auto burglaries is part of a national trend. Thieves can quickly enter a vehicle, often sight unseen. Items such as tools, wallets/purses, and electronics are popular targets, but virtually anything -loose change, sunglasses, and even phone chargers; are apt to be stolen. Increasingly, thieves are using personal and financial information stolen from vehicles to commit identity theft. Keys and garage door openers taken from vehicles can lead to residential burglaries.

The good news is auto burglary is a "Crime of Opportunity" and, therefore, largely preventable. Put simply, if you eliminate the opportunity, you will more than likely eliminate the crime. You can greatly decrease your chance of becoming a victim by practicing a few simple crime prevention measures:

- Lock your car and close the windows. This sounds obvious, but the majority of vehicles being targeted are left unlocked/unsecured. Only 12 of the 65 mentioned above were reported to be locked.
- Never leave your keys in your car when it is unattended, even when it is parked inside your enclosed garage. Avoid hidden magnetic key boxes- if you can find it, so can a thief.
- Make it a habit to check that your garage door is closed every night.
- Do not leave valuables, financial instruments, or forms of personal identification inside your car, especially in plain view. If you must, lock them in the trunk.
- If you park your car outside at night, try to park underneath a street light or in a well lit garage entry.
- Record serial numbers and familiarize yourself with the features of your devices; some have the ability to be tracked if stolen.

By following these tips, you can help us protect your property, and save yourself the stress of replacing your belongings or dealing with financial losses. Remember, if you see something suspicious, please do not hesitate to call 911.

## **Help Keep Our** Village Beautiful

Did you know that the City of Prairie Village found 1,238 code violations in 2017? That means that one out of every nine homes in the City had a code violation on their property. The City employs two full-time code enforcement officers who monitor the City and work with residents to resolve property maintenance issues. While we work hard to be proactive in addressing code violations, we believe it's a team effort and that we all need to play a role in keeping our village beautiful. Here are the most common violations we find throughout the City:

- Trash containers are not screened and are visible from the street
- Tall grass and weeds and overgrown vegetation
- Storing items outside in plain view of surrounding properties
- Exterior maintenance of properties (i.e. chipping paint and crumbling driveways)
- Inoperable and unlicensed vehicles
- Storage of RVs, boats, and trailers
- Trash and refuse on the property

Ensuring Prairie Village continues to be a beautiful community is one of our top priorities. You can help by maintaining your own property and reporting code violations to us on our website at www.pvkansas.com or calling 913-381-6464. When a violation does occur, the City is required to follow a process to address the issue, which sometimes results in the violation being sent to municipal court. When this happens, it can take quite some time to get the issue resolved, but rest assured that we are working hard to ensure properties are adequately maintained and issues are corrected as quickly as possible.





## **Neighborhood Design Standards Public Hearing Set for Sept. 11**

With an increase in the number of new single-family residential homes being built over the past couple years, the City is in the process of considering updates to our zoning regulations, particularly as it relates to the design of single-family residential properties. A committee of local design professionals and city staff have been working together for several months to draft new regulations that would govern the design of homes. This effort began at the direction of the City Council, with the goal of protecting neighborhood character while balancing the changing demographics and needs of the Prairie Village community.

During the month of July, we held three public forums and posted a survey on our website to gather feedback from our residents on the proposed guidelines. We received 625 responses to the survey and an average of 83% of respondents said they were in support of the changes as proposed. The next step in the process is holding a formal public hearing at the Planning Commission meeting on September 11. The meeting will be held at 6:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers at 7700 Mission Road.

The City values the opinions of our residents, and your input is certainly encouraged to help shape the future of our City.
