The festivities begin with a pancake breakfast hosted by Chris Cakes from 7:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. at the Harmon Park Pavilion. The patriotic ceremony will be held at 8:30 a.m. with Kansas City Symphony Chorus member and Prairie Village resident Kristy Lambert singing the National Anthem followed by the presentation of the Community Spirit Awards.

If you like baking, enter the annual pie baking contest for the chance to win a prize and bragging rights for the best pie. Register at www.pvkansas.com/piebakingcontest. This year, the contest will be held in a new location inside City Hall.

Other activities throughout the day run from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Returning favorites include a giant slip and slide, children's parade, live music, children's crafts, bounce houses and other inflatables, petting zoo and pony rides, face painters, living history exhibit, and much more. New this year is "The Little Village," a designated area for children aged three years and younger, located near the Community Center. Also, take the opportunity to visit with firefighters from Consolidated Fire District No. 2 and tour their brand new fire station, which will be open to the public during VillageFest.

TREE TRIMMING TO MITIGATE POWER OUTAGES

Prairie Village enjoys a beautiful tree canopy. According to KCP&L, there are an average of 168 trees per mile in Prairie Village. In KCP&L's entire service territory, the average number of trees per mile is 58. The same trees that provide beauty and shade throughout the year can also become problematic during inclement weather. To help prevent sustained power outages it's important to keep trees trimmed.

When trees interfere with the power line that connects directly to your house, trimming is your responsibility. Safety is KCP&L's first priority, so if you have vegetation near the power line that runs from the pole to your meter, fill out an online vegetation request at www.kcpl.com or call 888-471-5275 to schedule a line clearance request. Within five to seven days, barring inclement weather, KCP&L will send a crew member to review the vegetation's proximity to the power line. If the crew member determines the vegetation doesn't pose a threat to electrical service, no further action is necessary. If the crew member determines the vegetation poses a threat to electrical service, they'll work with you to schedule a time to disconnect—and then reconnect—your service line so you or your contractor can trim around the line.

If you see a potential issue with vegetation on the lines that run from pole to pole near your house, let KCP&L know by filling out an online vegetation request or calling the number above. KCP&L will send a crew member to review the vegetation's proximity to the power line and take action if appropriate.


PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

As the weather is becoming more pleasant and school is out for the summer, you will see many more pedestrians out enjoying the parks, commercial areas, and city facilities while out on foot.

We want all public areas to be safe and accessible to those who choose to walk or ride instead of drive. This would be a good time to address pedestrian safety for both those walking and those driving.

In the City of Prairie Village, if a sidewalk is available along a public roadway, pedestrians shall use the sidewalk provided. Pedestrians crossing the roadway at marked crosswalks shall have the right of way if they are entering into or in the crosswalk and vehicles shall yield to those pedestrians. However, pedestrians should also exercise due care and shall not suddenly leave a curb or sidewalk and walk or run into the path of a vehicle that is so close as to constitute an immediate hazard. Pedestrians crossing the roadway at a location without a marked or unmarked crosswalk shall yield the right of way to all vehicles upon the roadway.

All drivers should exercise care when driving on City streets and keep an eye out for walkers and bicyclists. Pedestrians should use the provided pedestrian pathways when in City parks, on City sidewalks, and in City retail areas, to be more visible to drivers. We want everyone to be safe and enjoy all areas of Prairie Village.



Many Prairie Village residents contribute to the beautification of our community by planting flowers or other plants in urns and statutes in traffic islands. It's important that there is no direct contact between plants and the statuary. Plant roots can grow into the pores of the stone and secrete acids, which can dissolve the stone leading to increased porosity. Water within the pores can freeze in the



winter, expand, and cause additional deterioration of the stone. If you intend to plant in one of these urns or statues, please use a liner or pot to avoid direct contact. Pots can easily be removed when the flowers die or become dormant.
