A Message from the Mayor



Dear friends and neighbors,

We've always known that Prairie Village is a remarkable, resilient city. But never before has our civic character been tested like this.

Our community has not been immune to the global damage suffered during this pandemic. Our beloved neighbors and relatives endured a COVID-19 outbreak with too many premature deaths at Brighton Gardens, tragically similar to long-term senior care facilities across the country. Other local businesses, and those who work there, incurred significant economic damage from the closures. Our City finances are taking a hit. And, as if a pandemic were not enough, we've recently seen civil unrest in the region.

Yet this crisis pulled us together in unprecedented ways. Thanks to your cooperation with stay-at-home measures, we flattened the initial curve. Doing so saved Prairie Village lives. Outside of long-term care facilities, Prairie Village has a relatively low infection rate. With proactive intervention by health authorities, government, and business, including heroes at Brighton Gardens, trends have been moving in the right direction.

Our businesses are standing up again, cautiously and responsibly, and we even have several outstanding new business openings to celebrate. We tightened the municipal fiscal belt and are doing relatively well compared to our city peers. Local government here, including policing and politics, remains largely civil, functional, fair and effective.

We were early movers to implement proactive emergency health measures in regional cooperation. As promised in my last Village Voice letter to you, essential City services continued seamlessly throughout this crisis. Our police, public works and other staff worked long, stressful hours, sometimes in dangerous conditions, to make it so.

We've recommitted to celebrate and encourage diversity, racial and otherwise. Our unwavering resolve to insist on fair, colorblind justice has never been stronger.

We've got rough seas still ahead of us, including expected additional waves. Please continue to heed the recommendations of health authorities. These include social distancing and masks where appropriate. In these pages and our website you can find specific guidance, updated frequently, for how to continue to do your part. Staff, Council, health experts, local business, the community and I are collaborating on enhanced messaging and mitigation as this situation evolves. Your ongoing engagement keeps it working well.

This turmoil has been tough on all of us. You've shown why this is such a special place even during the hardest times. Heart-warming acts of neighborly, inclusive kindness confirm daily that the Star of Kansas' unique "Prairie Village Way" shines brightest amidst adversity.

We are on the path to thrive again. If there is a silver lining here, it is that we are using these hard lessons to improve.

Pool complex to remain closed for 2020 season

The Prairie Village Pool Complex will not open this summer due to safety concerns for pool employees and area residents. The decision to keep the pool closed was made by the City Council based on recommendations from City staff in light of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

"We know this is a disappointing decision," said Assistant City Administrator Meghan Buum, who oversees the City's recreation programs. "It will be a tough summer for our community. We considered several alternatives to accommodate the Reopen Kansas Plan and CDC guidelines, but what it ultimately comes down to is the safety of our community and pool staff, most of whom are under the age of 18."

The inability to properly train more than 50 lifeguards while maintaining distance was another factor that played into the pool's closure.

"While we heard suggestions on how to enforce social distance among patrons, one problem we kept coming up against was how to provide required lifeguard certification training while maintaining six feet of separation between guards," Buum said. "For example, it typically takes three guards in close proximity to perform a spinal rescue."

After lengthy discussion at its May 4 meeting, the City Council ultimately voted 10-2 to close the pool. The timing of the decision was in part to allow seasonal staff to seek other employment opportunities.

Johnson County Wastewater begins infrastructure improvements

Johnson County Wastewater (JCW) in partnership with the cities of Leawood and Prairie Village is performing infrastructure improvements to the Mission Road corridor between 83rd Street and 93rd Street over the next two years.

The scheduled work will be completed in multiple phases with JCW's pipe project occurring first, beginning in the summer of 2020 through spring 2021. The second phase for utility relocation, street light-

ing, and sidewalks will begin in the fall of 2020 and run through the summer of 2021. The last phase, addressing pavement maintenance, will occur in the summer/fall of 2021.

The construction of these improvements will impact property owners and traffic through temporary sidewalk and lane closures along Mission Road. Two lanes of traffic, one in each direction, will be maintained throughout the projects.

Construction projects impact local streets

Construction season is in full swing in Prairie Village. Two of the community's busiest local streets are impacted by City road work. Work is underway on Tomahawk from 71st Street to Roe and Belinder from 73rd Street to 75th Street. Both are part of the residential street repair program.

Cartographer Gavin Jeter recognized as 2020 Arbor Day Honoree



The Prairie Village Tree Board has announced the 2020 Arbor Day Honoree is Gavin Jeter.

Each year, the City of Prairie Village and the Tree Board celebrate Arbor Day by planting a tree in honor of the Prairie Village Arbor Day Honoree. While the ceremony that usually accompanies the tree planting was canceled this year due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, the Prairie Village Public Works Department planted an American elm tree in Bennett Park in Jeter's honor.

In 2019 Jeter, a cartographer and former Prairie Village Tree Board member, used Google Maps to create an online map of all the trees in Prairie Village parks and all the Kansas State Champion Trees located throughout Prairie Village. To do this, Jeter and another Tree Board member walked all the parks to inventory and identi-

fy each tree. The map can be found on the City's website in the "maps" section of the "Discover Prairie Village" tab or at pvkansas.com/treemap. Visitors can click on any tree icon for pictures and information about the individual trees. The online map has had over 2000 hits since it was first posted last

Jeter and his wife, Kelly, are currently living in New Zealand, where he is on a business assignment. The Prairie Village Tree board hopes to reschedule the Arbor Day ceremony for later this year.

Also new to Bennett Park is signage in the playground area

where a massive American elm tree once stood. The tree died in 2018 and had to be cut down, but the six-foot-wide stump with a circumference of over 20 feet remains. Arborists estimate that the tree began growing in that spot in the early 1880s, during the area's pioneering days. It was one of the largest elms in Kansas at one time.

Crime prevention tips

As the community begins to reopen, everyone is excited to return to some form of normalcy, but so are burglars. When out in public, remember these tips to avoid being a victim of crime.

- Never leave a purse or wallet in plain view in your car
- Take your keys with you
- Lock your car door
- Move shopping bags to the trunk out of view 4.
- When you get home, take your bags inside immediately

Next, once you get home, remember to #9PMRoutine

- When you get home, take your bags inside immediately and remove all valuables
- Again, lock your car door- activate car alarm
- Close garage door (at night and during the day)
- Turn on exterior lights before bed
- Activate video doorbell (then sign up for the Village Video Cooperative!)



Dog safety advice from animal control

Whether a dog is known or unknown to you there are plenty of ways to stay safe around dogs. Even a 'friendly' dog can bite. It is important to remember to respect a dog's personal space and attitude. Be mindful that reaching to pet a dog or grabbing their collar can be scary for them. Excited or quick movements may also frighten them. A dog who feels scared or threatened can lead to an unsafe situation. The best way to introduce yourself to a dog is to allow the dog to approach you while you remain calm and still while they sniff you. Of course, this should only be done with the consent of the owner. Part of being a responsible dog owner is maintaining a safe environment for other people and your dog.

How to stay safe

- Always walk your dog on a leash
- Give other people and dogs space
- Ask before approaching a dog or allowing your dog to approach someone
- Pay attention- to your dog, the environment, and others
- Take precautions to ensure your dog doesn't run loose
- Dog waste transmits disease, please clean up after your pet
- Stay calm and enjoy time with your pet



How to avoid aggressive driving

Summertime is here, which means increasingly hot weather and sometimes dealing with aggressive drivers on our roadways. We have all been there -- you are running late for work, the kids are late for baseball practice, and you feel the urge to rush home to make dinner.

The Prairie Village Police Department wants to help you arrive at all your destinations safely. What is aggressive driving? According to the National Highway Safety Administration (NHTSA), aggressive driving is when "an individual commits a combination of moving traffic offenses to endanger other persons or property." Do you ever drive aggressively? Here are some tips to avoid being a part of the problem.

How to Avoid Aggressive Drivers

- Get out of their way and steer clear of them on the road.
- Stay relaxed. Remember that reaching your destination safely and calmly is your goal.
- Do not challenge them. Avoid eye contact. Ignore rude gestures and refuse to return them.
- Give them the benefit of the doubt. Not all aggressive driving behavior is directed at you.
- Do not block the passing lane, especially if you are driving slower than most of the traffic. Move to the right lane.

How to Avoid Being an Aggressive Driver

- Allow more travel time to get to your destination. It reduces stress dramatically.
- Come to a full stop at red lights and stop signs. Never run yellow lights.
- Let other drivers merge with you.
- Obey posted speed limits.
- Never follow other drivers too closely.
- Resist temptation to teach someone "a lesson."
- Concentrate on driving, not on cell phones, stereo, passengers or other distractions.
- Remember you cannot control traffic, but you can control yourself, your driving, and your emotions.

Final farewell to longtime city administrator



Barbara Vernon, who served as City Administrator of Prairie Village for 30 years, passed away in May. Her contributions to Prairie Village were innumerable. Vernon was one of the first female city administrators/city managers in the United States. She mentored several younger women in the field and lectured on Women in Management at Avila College and on Public Administration at UMKC.

Along with Mayor Sid Powell of Mission, she organized the North East Johnson County Economic Development Council which became the North East Johnson County Chamber of Commerce, served on its board for many years, and was named Ambassador of the year in 2001.

At Prairie Village, she instituted an award-winning annual budget and financial

statement as well as long-range planning for budgets and city finances. She also served as interim public works director, riding snow plows at 2 a.m. She helped select several police chiefs, helped develop and manage several parks and the pool complex and negotiated with the developer of Claridge Court.

Vernon participated in the Leadership Kansas program, was a member of many professional associations and organizations, represented the City with the National League of Cities, The Kansas League of Cities, the Kansas Legislature, and received many professional awards, including

the 2007 L.P. Cookingham Award For Outstanding Public Service from the Greater K.C. Chapter of the Association of Public Administration. She also served on the Greater Kansas City United Way review board.

Following retirement in 2007, she served on the Prairie Village Foundation Board, raising money for residents in need, organized the mayor's annual holiday tree project and the ginger bread house decorating event. She was named the City's Volunteer of the Year in 2015. Upon retirement, the Foundation placed a statue, 'The Spirit of Prairie Village,' in the Municipal Campus's garden in her honor.
