#### Safety Corner

#### "Fall" Into Safety

Cooler weather, football, and the foliage changing colors signals that fall has arrived. With the change, residents will be spending more time in their homes preparing for the cooler weather and the upcoming holiday season. The Prairie Village Police Department's Crime Prevention Unit suggests residents prepare their homes by conducting a residential security survey.

A residential security survey is simply looking for weak or vulnerable entry points into your home, which a burglar may use to advantage. Listed below are some security suggestions to use as you prepare your home for the cooler season ahead.

 All doors that lead to the exterior of the residence and doorframes should be of solid wood or metal construction. This includes basement and interior garage doors.

- Replace worn-out window hardware such as latches, locks, screws, and pins.
- All outside doors and inside garage doors should have securely mounted deadbolt locks with a minimum 1-1/2 inch throw.

- Strike plates should be affixed to the *Clausius* doorframe with a minimum of two fully threaded 3 inch screws.
- All points of entry into the residence should be properly illuminated and clear of obstructions.

As you prepare your home to keep the cool weather out, prepare your home to keep burglars out, too. Remember to dial **9-1-1** <u>immediately</u> if you observe any suspicious activity at your residence or in your neighborhood.

#### Leaf Etiquette





The Public Works department requests your cooperation this Fall. As trees throughout the City drop their leaves, it's tempting to simply blow or rake them into the street. However, doing this causes many problems for Public Works crews who try to keep City streets and storm drains clean. In addition, obstructing a storm drain is against the law.

When leaves pile up against the curb and gutter, they clog storm drains. This can cause water to back-up during heavy rains, and create a traffic hazard. Likewise, when leaves are raked into drainage channels, it can cause these channels to back up and flood streets and your neighbors' yards. So this Fall, remember to dispose of your leaves properly by bagging or mulching them.
