- Whenever possible, avoid riding your bicycle at night.
- Wear reflective clothing when outdoors at night.
- Remember to obey all traffic laws when on a City street.
- If exercising, remember to use the sidewalk if one is available. If no sidewalk is available, go against or facing oncoming traffic.
- If skateboarding or cycling on private property, remember to observe all posted signs. Many business areas have posted signs prohibiting cycling or skateboarding on their busy sidewalks to avoid accidents and property damage.

### ANIMAL CONTROL QUESTION OF THE MONTH

#### What should I do if my pet gets lost?

#### 1. Call Prairie Village Animal Control

If your pet is lost, your first call should be to the Police Dispatch Center at 913-642-5151. A Dispatcher will ask you to provide some general information and alert Prairie Village Animal Control. An Animal Control Officer will contact you to get additional information if needed. Do not call Animal Control direct to report a missing animal as it may be several hours before an Animal Control Officer returns to the office to check voice-mail messages.

#### 2. Contact the "Prairie Village Pound"

Next, contact Animal Medical Center at 204 W. 75th St. (816-333-4484) to see if your animal has already been picked up by Animal Control. Animals picked up by Animal Control are taken to this location if the Animal Control Officer is unable to locate the animal's owner.

#### 3. Contact neighboring cities

If you live on the border of another city, it's a good idea to contact the Animal Control units of those cities. Pets

#### 4. Check the newspapers and notify neighbors

Always check newspapers in the lost/found columns. You may also want to make flyers telling others that your pet is lost. Contact Animal Control as to how to word your flyer for the best results and where to legally post them within the city.
