

Trash Tips

How can you keep trash and recyclables from blowing around the neighborhood on trash day? Well, neither the City nor Deffenbaugh can control the wind, but, as residents, we can take a few easy steps to keep the problem of blowing trash to a minimum.

- 1. Package your newspapers separately for recycling, or weight them down with heavier items such as glass, tin cans, etc.
- 2. Put your trash in bags before placing it in the garbage can and keep garbage cans covered.
- 3. Use trash cans rather than placing loose trash bags at the curb. This will help keep the bags from being ripped open by animals or when they're picked up for collection.

School Recycling Program Underway

The Prairie Village Environment/Recycle Committee All that is required is active strikes again!!. The group that brought curbside and yard waste recycling to Prairie Village, corrugated paper recycling to the Corinth and Prairie Village Shopping Centers, and Buy-Recycled notices in local stores has now helped bring a comprehensive recycling program to Prairie Village schools.

Seven of the eight public schools in Prairie Village have started the Paper Retriever Program offered by Donohue Recycling, a Texas-based paper mill. Virtually all paper used in the school can be recycled through this program, including office, fax, any color construction paper, had food in it, such as pizza boxes. magazines, envelopes, sticky notes, newspaper, file folders, and more. Recycling couldn't be easier. The program was described to school representatives and Environment/Recycle Committee members by Delores Walton, the project manager for Donohue Recycling. She also visited individual schools to explain this exciting recycling program in detail.

One of the best parts about this program is that there is no financial investment from the schools or parents. In fact, the program pays each school for paper recycled at the school, making recycling a fund-raising activity.

These discussions not only highlight the interest Prairie Village residents have in the community, they also bring out some common questions such as:

- How much of the City's revenue comes from property taxes?
- Is the crime rate in Prairie Village going up or down?
- How much does the City spend on streets and storm drainage projects?

One of the ways the City attempts to answer these questions is through the Annual Report, a document which summarizes the City's activities and accomplishments, and provides financial information about how the City spends our money. The Annual Report also provides elected officials, City employees, and citizens with a reference guide to questions about Prairie Village.

The 1999 Annual Report was recently published and presented to the City Council. Although the Annual Report is a document nearly 150 pages long, it is organized in an easy to read format, and an eight page summary can provide useful information to answer many of your questions. Copies of the 1999 Annual Report summary are available at the City Clerk's Office.

At home, Dick became active in the Prairie Village Homes


