# Public Works goes green with new building

The Prairie Village Public Works Department will soon move into its newly constructed facility at 3535 Somerset Drive.

The \$10 million project (including the building construction, as well as utility work, site preparation, parking structures, furniture, equipment, inspections, design, etc.) is expected to achieve the highest level of LEED certification: LEED Platinum. LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) is the most widely-used green building rating

system in the world. Available for virtually all building types, LEED provides a framework for healthy, highly-efficient, and cost-saving green buildings. LEED certification is a globally recognized symbol of sustainability achievement and leadership.

The City hopes to hold an open house at the facility later this fall. Until then, turn to page 10 of this issue of the Village Voice for a quick look inside the facility and some of its features.

# Residents invited to participate in public hearing regarding 2022 budget and revenue neutral rate

The Prairie Village City Council will meet at 6 p.m. September 7 to hear public input relating to the proposed 2022 budget and the Revenue Neutral Rate. The City has long been required by State Statute to hold a public hearing relating to the following year's budget and property tax rate. The requirement to hold a Revenue Neutral Rate public hearing was passed into law in 2021.

The revenue neutral rate is the tax rate that would generate the same total property tax in dollars for the City as the previous tax year using the current tax year's total assessed valuation. In Prairie Village, the revenue neutral rate would be 18.386 mills. Since the proposed budget requires 19.321 mills, a public hearing is required. The rate of 19.321 is the same rate as the 2021 budget and is not an increase to the mill levy rate.

The 2022 budget continues to focus on community priorities: Maintaining a high quality of life; providing superior services; focusing on community safety; remaining mindful of the tax burden; investing in the public realm; and focusing on environmental sustainability. The proposed budget can be found in it's entirety on the City's website.

Based on the proposed property tax rate, the average Prairie Village homeowner will pay \$70/month for City services. (This number is based on the average Prairie Village home value of \$380,419.) Since the property tax rate is not changing, your property taxes will fluctuate with the value of your home. So if your home value goes down or stays flat, your taxes will not increase, and if the value increases, your taxes will increase proportionately. The difference between the proposed property tax rate and the revenue neutral rate is approximately \$3.00 per month for the average homeowner. The difference to the City budget is \$500,000.

Please contact the Finance Department if you have questions or comments about the 2022 budget.

The public hearings will be held as part of the September 7 regular City Council Meeting. To participate in the



If you would like to speak live during the public hearing, you must notify the City Clerk with your name, address, and email address. The City will call on those who have signed up to speak once the public hearing begins.

# Save the date: Corinth Quarter grand opening

First Washington will host a grand opening and ribbon cutting ceremony for Corinth Quarter from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. September 16. Corinth Quarter is located at the site of the old Mission Road Antique Mall, which included part of the old barn that was part of the Woolford Farms horse training operation in the early 20th century. The only Kansas-bred horse to win the

Kentucky Derby, Lawrin, was produced by Woolford Farms. To pay tribute to the important history of this site, old wood from the stables was re-used in one of the courtyards at Corinth Quarter on three custommade benches. Bricks from the old building were also used in the courtyard area, as well as the placement of a commemorative plaque.

# Skate Park ribbon cutting will be September 15

The newly reconstructed skate park at Harmon Park will open September 15. Area skaters are invited to participate in a ribbon cutting event that will begin at 4 p.m.

Prairie Village's first skate park became a reality thanks to the efforts of Prairie Village eighth graders Jake Shepard and Andy Peterson. In December 2001, the two began collecting money for the project in a plastic box. By the summer of 2002, the mayor had appointed them members of an ad Jake's committee. battle with cancer inspired Andy and other community kids and parents to help raise funds for the project. Their efforts over 3.5 years brought major donations from the City of Prairie Village, the City of Mission

Hills, the Helen Boylan Foundation, the Prairie Village Arts Council for the Rhett Johnson Sculpture, Prairie Village Municipal Foundation, Johnson County Parks & Recreation, and many individuals. Jake died on March 5, 2003. On his 17th birthday, June 7, 2005, the original park, built by Grindline of Seattle, was dedicated the Harmon Park Skate Park.

After years of heavy use, the skate park, known unofficially as "Jake Park," began showing signs of deterioration. A series of community meetings were held to gather input. This summer. the skate park removed, entirely was redesigned, and rebuilt by New Line Skate Parks and Superior Bowen.

### 2021 Prairie Village Jazz Festival canceled

It is with heavy hearts that we announce the cancellation of this year's Prairie Village Jazz Festival, scheduled to be held on Sept. 11, 2021. On August 13, the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) amended its quarantine list to include anyone who is not fully vaccinated and attends an in-state mass gathering of 500 or more, where individuals do not socially distance and wear a mask. Though our event is held outdoors, attendance has traditionally been many times larger than the KDHE's threshold of 500 people. It is also an event that attracts many families, so children under 12 who are not yet

eligible for vaccinations would be included in the quarantine recommendation under the KDHE guidelines. The ability to manage this event with a volunteer staff and protect the health, safety and enjoyment of our attendees, performers and volunteers is simply beyond our capacity.

The Prairie Village JazzFest Committee sincerely thanks the community, the Prairie Village Mayor and City Council, Prairie Village city administrators and staff for their input and support in making this difficult decision. We look forward to bringing JazzFest to its many fans in 2022 and hope to see you then.



## Juneteenth celebration held in Franklin Park

Prairie Village's inaugural Juneteenth Freedom Celebration was held Saturday, June 19 in Franklin Park. The event was hosted by Stand-Up For Black Lives + Prairie Village in partnership with the City of Prairie Village Diversity Committee and Johnson County NAACP.

Juneteenth is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. On June 19, 1865, months after the Civil War ended, Union General Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas and read General Order No. 3 informing the quarter of a million African Americans who were still slaves in Texas that they were free. That December, slavery in America was formally abolished with the adoption of the 13th Amendment. Juneteenth (June 19th), also referred to as "Freedom Day" has been celebrated by African Americans for the past 156 years.

The event was organized by the Stand Up for Black Lives+ Prairie Village team in partnership with JCNAACP and the Prairie Village Diversity Committee.


# **Evergy offers text alerts**

# PV Foundation helps local families prepare for new school year

Back to school season means purchasing school supplies, lunch backpacks, clothing and shoes. All of these costs add up quickly. When budgets run thin for families, some parents need additional help this time of year. The Prairie Village Foundation works directly with area school principals to pinpoint local children who might benefit from the Back to School with a Firefighter program. This year, the program helped 10 deserving children by providing school supplies, Target cards for new shoes and clothing, and HyVee cards for healthy after school snacks. In a typical year, firefighters take the elementary aged kids shopping to pick out items prior to heading back to the station for a pizza party; however, due to COVID-19, the items were delivered to families instead. The Foundation and Consolidated Fire District #2 NE Johnson County believe it is imperative to provide children with new school supplies and clothes, with a hope they will feel empowered and confident on the first day of school.

### A few reminders regarding yard waste

The City of Prairie Village contracts with Republic Services to provide weekly curbside collection of yard waste for most residential properties in the city. In some areas, homes associations provide this service (Corinth Downs, Countryside East, Paddock Court, Corinth Place Villas, Village Park, and Town & Country). If you live in one of these neighborhoods, you should contact your homes association to see if any changes have been made to your service.

Yard waste should be placed in a biodegradable paper bag or a 33-gallon or smaller rigid container. If using a rigid container, please drill drainage holes in the bottom and use a lid whenever possible.

Do not put sticks or branches in the rigid containers. Instead, bundle them and wrap the bundles in twine. Standard bundles of 4 feet in length, less than 18 inches in circumference, and less than 50 pounds are allowed. Individual branches within the bundle cannot be more than 3 inches in diameter. Logs are not accepted.

Residents are allowed 12 yard waste items per week, year round. This includes any combination of bags and bundles.

Any excess yard waste can be set out in approved containers, bags, or bundles but will require an overflow waste sticker at a cost of \$1.25 per item. Overflow waste stickers are sold in sheets of five or ten and are available at these locations:

- Prairie Village City Hall, 7700 Mission Road, Prairie Village
- Westlake Hardware, 4049 Somerset, Prairie Village
- Euston Hardware, 6955 Tomahawk Road, Prairie Village

### Public Works goes green (continued from page 1)

Outlined are some of the environmentally-friendly features of the new public works facility.

Location & Transportation: By providing bicycle storage and public electric vehicle charging stations, the project encourages building users to use alternative transportation options and help reduce greenhouse gas emissions from transportation.

Water Efficiency: Native plants were installed that require no irrigation to help reduce water consumption. WaterSense and Energy Star fixtures and appliances were installed. The facility uses a rainwater collection system to provide non-potable water that is used for flushing toilets. These methods result in a 76% reduction in water use compared to similar buildings.

Energy & Atmosphere: With the help of energy-efficient systems, efficient LED lighting, and solar photo voltaic panels on the roof, the building's overall modeled energy cost savings are 78% when compared to a baseline model.

Materials & Resources: During construction, efforts were made to reduce construction and demolition waste disposed in landfills and incineration facilities by recovering, reusing, and recycling materials. The project and construction team has been able to divert 88% of construction waste from the landfill.

Indoor Environmental Quality: Low emitting materials were installed to provide healthier indoor air quality and to reduce concentrations of chemical contaminants that can damage air quality, human health, productivity, and the environment. These products included low VOC paints, adhesives, flooring, wood products, ceilings and insulation. Additionally, a building flushout and air quality testing will be completed to ensure a healthy environment for occupants.



Solar panels mounted on the roof are expected to supply just over 50% of the building's power needs.

# Know your rights when solicitors come calling

Door-to-door solicitation is a common business practice that may bring strangers to your neighborhood. It's important to know your rights and what you can expect from licensed solicitors.

Door-to-door solicitation is the practice of going onto private property unannounced with the intent of selling goods or services for a profit. The City's current solicitation ordinance was written with the safety of residents in mind.

According to the City's door-to-door solicitation ordinance:

### **For-profit solicitors:**

- Must obtain a permit from the City and display it while soliciting in Prairie Village.
- May call on residences between 10:00 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. and from 7:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.
- May not call on or approach any residence displaying a "No Solicitation," "No Trespassing" sign or any other similar notice.
- Must wear photo I.D. at all times.
- Must leave a resident's property when directed to do so by the resident.

#### **Residents may:**

- Require a solicitor to present his or her permit and photo identification.
- Obtain "No Solicitors" stickers free of charge at the Prairie Village municipal building or Police Department lobby. A "No Solicitors" notice can also be clipped out of this page and posted on your door.
- Require the solicitor to provide a receipt for any purchase exceeding \$5.00.
- Contact the Police Department at 913-642-6868 if a solicitor comes to a door when the home is posted "No Solicitors."

# Find your election information

Voter registration closes 21 days before any election. That means if you aren't already a registered voter, you must register by October 12 if you wish to vote in the November 2 General Election. This election will determine who will fill half of the seats on the Prairie Village City Council.

In Kansas, you must re-register each time you change your name, address, or party affiliation for voting. Please note, you CANNOT register to vote at City Hall, but you can do so online at https://www.kdor.ks.gov/Apps/VoterReg/Default.aspx. You can download a paper registration form in English or in Spanish on the Secretary of State's website at https://sos.ks.gov/elections/voter-information.html. Paper forms must be mailed to the County Election Officer using the information on the form. Information regarding advance voting and voter accessibility is also available on the same website. Registered voters can find their polling place online at myvoteinfo.voteks.org/voterview.
