The month of August signals the beginning of a new school year and presents educators and students with the opportunity to approach learning opportunities with fresh vision and renewed vigor.

New federal legislation, often referred to as the "No Child Left Behind" initiative, has garnered a great deal of publicity in recent months. This mandate is aimed at improving the academic performance of all children nationwide. In Shawnee Mission, educating every child to the maximum of his or her capability has long been a goal of the patrons, parents, teachers, administrators, and the board of education. We have always believed in educational programs that emphasize high student achievement, rigorous assessment of student progress, and professional accountability-in short, programs and services that "leave no child behind."

For more than 30 years, the Shawnee Mission School District has produced a successful combination of comprehensive programs and services to meet the needs of all students. Facilitated by superior instruction by qualified professionals, motivated students backed by encouraging parents, and a supportive community committed to quality education, Shawnee Mission programs have received regional and national attention for their effectiveness.

Historically, families have come to this community seeking the outstanding educational experiences offered by the Shawnee Mission School District—and they still do! Shawnee Mission students continue to excel above their state and national peers on standardized tests; in fact, last year students earned results considered to be among the highest in district history on the lowa Tests of Basic Skills. More than 100 graduates of the class of 2003 received special recognition from the National Merit Scholarship Program for earning scores in the top 5 percent of students taking the Preliminary SAT. Of these students, 34 were named finalists in the National Merit Scholarship competition. Shawnee Mission students make up more than 20 percent of the merit finalists in the state, despite the fact that district seniors comprise only 6 percent of Kansas seniors.

Additionally, Shawnee Mission students and staff are frequently recognized for their accomplishments locally, regionally, and nationally. Shawnee Mission graduating seniors received scholarship offers totaling more than \$26 million in 2003. Indian Hills Middle School received the John Herklotz Award from the National Association of Secondary School Principals for outstanding contributions to democratic participation. Kathleen Zigeler, a teacher at Mission Valley Middle School, was named an Edyth May Sliffe award winner for excellence in mathematics and science teaching to students in grades 7 and 8.

Through the decades, Shawnee Mission has been featured in various publications as one of the top school districts in the nation. For 12 consecutive years, Expansion Management magazine has awarded Shawnee Mission a gold medal rating, placing the district in the top 17 percent of school districts nationwide.

The tradition of educational excellence that is the hallmark of Shawnee Mission continues to flourish because of the dedication and support provided by the community. The value that has been and continues to be placed on quality education by our parents and patrons will keep the tradition of learning in Shawnee Mission strong for generations to come.

2003 Missouri & Kansas River Cleanup Event Saturday, September 13th

September 13th has been set as the date for a massive cleanup effort on the Missouri and Kansas rivers. Headquartered in Kansas City's Berkley Park, the cleanup will involve a 25-mile section of the Missouri River, and will include the lower section of the Kansas River. While plans for the Kansas City effort are still in development, past cleanups have utilized a tugboat and four barges, numerous workboats, and up to 20 watercraft to shuttle participants on the river.

The Mid-America Regional Council and numerous local partners are enthusiastically supporting this clean-up event. With the revitalization of the Kansas City riverfront in anticipation of the Lewis & Clark Bicentennial Commemoration next year, this event is expected to excite the public through hands-on activism out on the rivers.


JERRY ELLIS
