Bicycle Safety

For children, bicycles can be the first step to independence and freedom. They can ride over to their friends' houses after school, or down to the Prairie Village Shops without their parents. Bikes give children their first taste of self reliance, but with freedom comes added responsibility.

Below are some topics parents should discuss with children prior to giving them the responsibility of a bicycle:

- ❖ Parents need to teach basic traffic safety laws and review them often. For questions regarding these laws, contact the Crime Prevention Officer.
- ❖ Parents need to review the safest routes to and from common locations their children will be visiting. This will assist parents in knowing which route their child will be taking and encourage children to tell their parents if they are going to take a different route.
- * Riders should wear helmets at all times. Parents should set a good example by wearing a helmet, too. Helmets should fit properly and can be fitted professionally at a cycle shop.
- ❖ Children need to be reminded to follow all posted signs regarding bicycles on private property. If it is posted, "No Bicycles On Sidewalk," children need to obey the property's rules.
- Children should be responsible for their bicycle and keep it locked and secured when it's unattended. Many unsecured bicycles are stolen from front yards and bicycle racks all over Prairie Village. Police Officers routinely stop at homes and move bicycles from the front yard closer to the house.
- ❖ Parents should record the model and serial number of their child's bicycle in case it is stolen. These numbers are important in order to track, recover or return the bicycle.

Mayor's Message



Preparations for the City's 2004 annual budget began this February when Council members met in a day-long goal setting session. At that time, elected officials knew 2004 would be a very difficult budget year. With the loss of over \$300,000 in revenue from the State of Kansas, the Council rec-

ognized that balancing the City's 2004 budget would be a major challenge. Faced with this dilemma, the City Council identified essential City services, agreeing that some items not be compromised in an effort to balance the 2004 budget. These services are:

- Police Patrol
- Code Enforcement
- The City's Capital Expenditure Program for street and storm drainage work.

From March through May, City Department Managers prepared program budgets in an effort to produce a balanced budget while maintaining essential services. Budget worksessions began on June 2nd, and have been held every Monday night since, to ensure the City's 2004

budget will continue to maintain the high quality services Prairie Village residents demand and deserve.

In the March issue of this column, I asked Prairie Village residents to help the staff and City Council set priorities for 2004. From discussions with neighbors and friends, it seems clear we all enjoy living in Prairie Village and want to maintain the "Village lifestyle" we've all come to enjoy.

Prairie Village residents will once again have an opportunity to provide input regarding the City's proposed budget. A public hearing will be held on Monday, August 4th at 7:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers. All Prairie Village residents are welcome to attend and participate in this public hearing.

Also note that the Prairie Village JTL Tournament will be held July 21-July 24 at the Harmon Courts from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. using all ten courts.

What Do I Do If I Find a Dead Bird In My Yard?

Prairie Village Animal Control will be tracking dead crows and blue jays that are found in the area between June and October 2003. They **WILL NOT** pick them up! Residents must dispose of the dead birds.

If you find a deceased bird in your yard, call Animal Control at 913-642-6868, extension 4898. They will need to know the date **the bird was found, the location and the type of bird**. Leave a message if no one answers.

Remember Animal Control <u>WILL NOT</u> pick up the deceased birds. Use gloves or a shovel to place the dead bird into a plastic bag and then place them in your outdoor trash. There is currently no evidence that West Nile Virus can be spread directly from an infected bird to people.

However, dead birds can carry other diseases and should never be handled with bare hands.

The Health Department is not testing dead birds since the virus has already been found in Johnson County.
