Summer Safety Tips

The rising temperatures and extra daylight make it a perfect time to clean, organize and make those needed renovations or changes to your home. Now is an ideal time to get outside and take a look at the security of your home. There are many simple steps you can take to

help avoid becoming a victim of a burglary. Here are some of these simple steps:

- Have a residential security survey performed on your home by the Crime Prevention Officer. The survey addresses locks, lighting, landscaping and other security and safety issues. The survey is free of charge to Prairie Village residents.
- Keep doors and windows locked and secure at all times.
 Many burglaries occur through unsecured or open doors or windows both during daytime and nighttime hours.
 Locks are not for looks they are to be used.
- Use your lights at night! Put inside lights on timers to give the appearance that someone is home. Burglars have been known to drive the streets after dark and pick

- which homes they want to target due to lack of interior lighting. Exterior lighting can also be a deterrent to criminal activity. Be sure to place exterior lighting up high and out of reach of a possible burglar.
- Utilize the Housewatch Program when you go out of town. When leaving town, call the Police Communications Center at 913-642-5151, and request your home be placed on Housewatch. A police officer will periodically check the security of your home while you are away.
- Report suspicious activity to the police when you see it!
 Police officers are on duty 24 hour a days, 7 days a week and available to respond to your call. Police would rather investigate the activity when it happens than respond later to take a criminal activity report.
- Get in the habit of keeping your home safe and secure and teach your family to do the same!

Since its announcement in January, the Department has received correspondence from over 200 residents wanting to add their non-published phone numbers to the system and two requests to be removed from the system. We received many questions on how the system works, what it will be used for and if the system is capable of contacting residents who use special communication devices.

The City wishes to ensure that this important service is provided to its residents who need special communications in order to receive messages from the Communicator emergency notification system. • June 27th • July 18th • August 8th




Mission Road Bridge Replacement: Construction to Begin June 16th

The Mission Road bridge between Mission Lane and Tomahawk Road will be replaced beginning June 16th and take approximately ninety (90) days to complete. The following detours will be used:
