Tree lighting to be December 2

The event will kick off at 6 p.m. with performances from Dancerz Unlimited, the Shawnee Mission East Chamber Choir, the Shawnee Mission East Drumline and more.

The Mayor's Holiday Tree Lighting is the major fundraiser for the Prairie Village Foundation. The Foundation began in 1983 to raise funds for the Prairie Village Park system and has grown to become a resource to help area residents who find themselves in need of assistance. The Foundation supports utility and rental assistance, minor home repair, food assistance and other needs vital to our community.

In 2020, the Foundation supported the food pantries located at churches in Prairie Village. With our partners at the Shawnee Mission Cares Fund, we provided utility and rent assistance for students that attend our Prairie Village schools. The Foundation also supports arts and recreational scholarships for families. Back to School with a Firefighter and Shop with a Cop are two programs the foundation supports to provide local children with the supplies they need for a successful school year and a meaningful holiday season.

A Message from the Mayor



Dear friends and neighbors,

Along with the brilliant colors of our treasured tree canopy, this fall we enjoy exciting improvements, initiatives and accomplishments throughout Prairie Village.

A sample of my personal favorites:

Efficient 2022 Budget Investment. We adopted a 2022 budget that invests primarily in public safety and infrastructure, including material increases to police and road budgets. By emphasizing efficiency, we did this without raising our relatively low property tax rates. The City's General Fund operating expense budget was held to less than the current

annual rate of inflation. Some residents will see effective tax rate decreases in 2022 with cash back through our new and expanded grant programs. Our home values continue to grow. Our Aaa top-rated City finances remain exceptionally strong.

Outstanding Infrastructure Improvements. We recently completed several major road improvement and drainage projects. Our already-high road quality ratings are rising. In September, our new public works building opened to serve us for the next fifty-plus years with state-of-the-art functionality and sustainability features. We refurbished our skate park, already the "best in the metro" according to aficionados. In 2022, look for a new Harmon Park playset, Windsor Park restrooms, Meadowbrook Park enhancements, a drainage project on Mission Road, more rehabilitated streets, and many other infrastructure improvements. We are resuming discussion of significant renovations to our aging City Hall, pools, community and recreation facilities on our Mission Road civic center campus.

New Business and Redevelopment Surging. To describe each of the amazing new businesses opening in Prairie Village, I'd need three more pages. New Corinth Quarter is filling up fast with exciting locally-owned tenants, quickly becoming an area fitness mecca. A mixed-use renovation plan will substantially improve the Prairie Village Shops' former Macy's space. Meadowbrook Shopping Center at 95th and Nall has major improvements and new tenants coming as well.

Diversified Housing Portfolio. Our sustained civic success is raising our home values and increasing our quality of life. It is also, however, impacting the diversity of the housing portfolio historically available in Prairie Village. Our workforce, including cops, teachers, nurses, firefighters, retail workers, young professionals starting out, as well as seniors on fixed incomes, are increasingly struggling to attain and retain residency in or near Prairie Village. City Council, staff, residents and I are looking into this and will be making recommendations in the coming months through our Housing Committee. There is a path addressing these challenges while simultaneously embracing and encouraging beneficial market forces. With your thoughtful input, we'll chart that path to preserve and enhance the good things we've always loved about Prairie Village, including our diversified housing portfolio.

As we head into this special holiday season, let's savor moments of collective gratitude for these and the many other blessings we share in this village we call home.

SKATE PARK RULES

- Respect your park.
- No glass containers, alcohol, tobacco products, drugs, loud music, vandalism, soliciting, fires, motorized vehicles, littering, sleeping, or unpermitted events or vending.
- Leash and clean up after your dog.
- All non-motorized vehicles are welcome, including bikes, skateboards, scooters, and inline skates.
- Parents/guardians are responsible for supervising their children.
- Spectators and pedestrians should not enter the skate area.
- Make sure your riding equipment is in good working condition.
- Inspect the park before use, and stay off surfaces when wet or otherwise hazardous.

No hate just skate. The skate park is an all-inclusive environment. Everyone is welcome regardless of race, age, gender, sexual orientation, creed, economic status, or abilities.

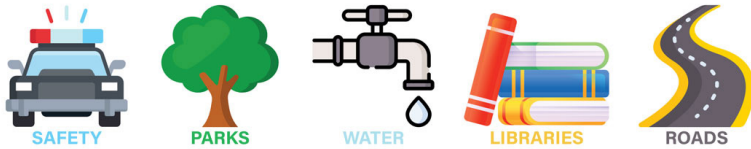
Cities celebrate Home Rule Day

October 11 was celebrated as Home Rule Day in Kansas. This year marks the 60th anniversary of Home Rule in our state. Before 1960, a state statute was required to authorize a city to take action on a particular issue — a city had no power to act at the local level. If a city wanted to move on anything, from animal control to fire prevention, they first had to petition the state legislature for statutory permission. This type of state oversight prevented cities from being innovative and adapting to the rapidly changing environments in which they continue to operate. Home Rule is the solution.

What is HOME RULE?

Local decision-making. Self-government. Citizen-centered solutions.

We have **625** cities in the State of Kansas. All are different, with unique needs and services. Commonly, cities offer these services:

2022 BUDGET

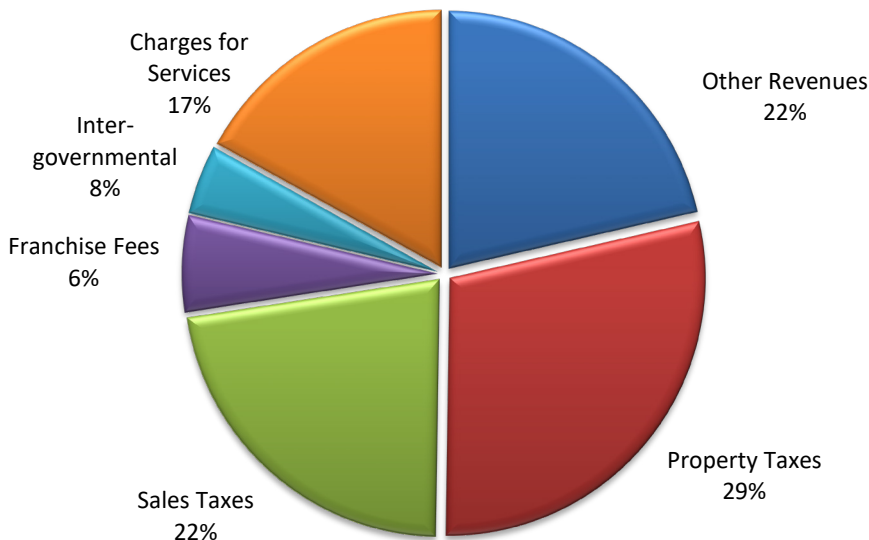
The annual budget serves as a financial plan, provides guidance to City staff, and communicates the City’s financial condition. Most importantly, it presents the Governing Body’s vision for the community by describing how public funds are spent in order to achieve policy objectives.

2022 Revenue Sources - All Funds



Property Tax- Tax on real estate and personal property. It is computed by applying the City’s mill rate to the County’s assessed valuation

Sales Tax- Tax comes from two sources: Local Sales Tax and County Sales Tax

Franchise Fees- Franchise fees are charged on major utilities within the City. The fee is 5% of gross receipts as defined and permitted by state statutes

Charges for Services- Includes revenue that is a charge for contract services and special assessments to recipients of certain services

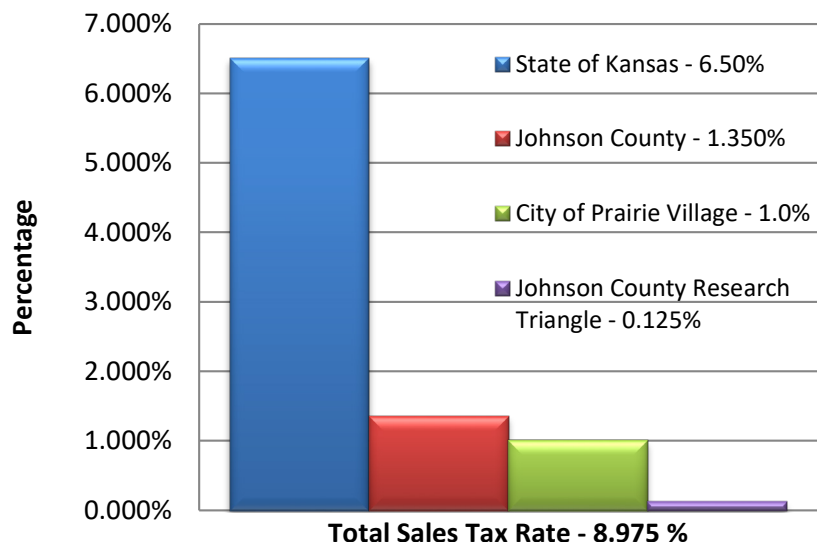
Inter-governmental- Includes revenues provided by other jurisdictions, primarily the State and Federal governments

Other Revenues- Includes use tax, motor vehicle tax, liquor tax, license and permits, recreation fees, fines, interest income and miscellaneous revenue

SALES TAX

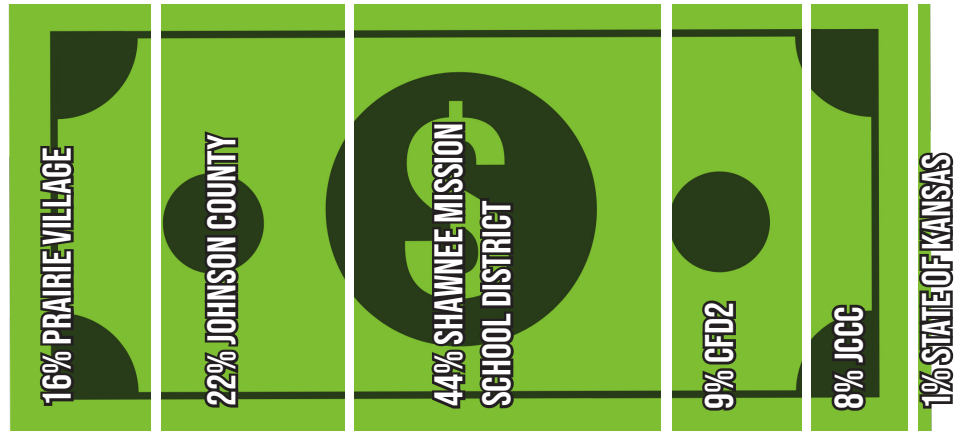
In Prairie Village, sales tax is collected by four entities - the State of Kansas, Johnson County, the City of Prairie Village, and the Johnson County Research Triangle. The total sales tax in Prairie Village is 8.975%. An additional 1% is applied to purchases made at Corinth Square and the Prairie Village Shops due to the Community Improvement Districts (CID) established at those locations. The total sales tax rate at those locations is 9.975%.

Sales Tax Rate by Entity

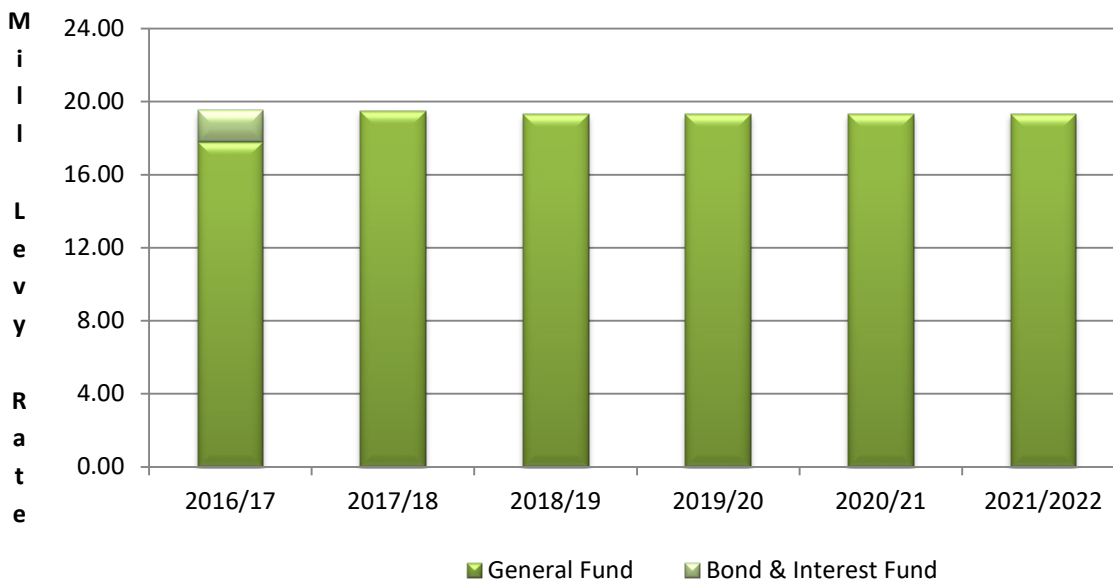


PROPERTY TAX

For Prairie Village residents, the property tax bill is divided among several entities. The City collects 16%. The other taxing entities are: Johnson County, Shawnee Mission School District, Consolidated Fire District #2 (CFD2), Johnson County Community College (JCCC), and the State of Kansas.



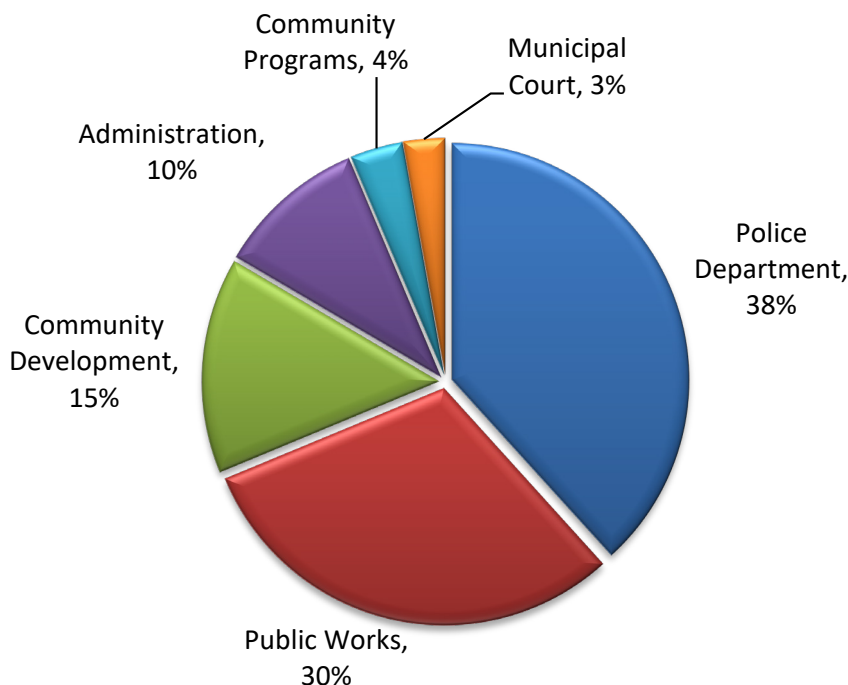
City Mill Levy Rate 2016 - 2022



MILL LEVY

The mill levy rate is applied to property's assessed valuation. The 2022 budget did not include a mill levy rate increase. The mill levy rate was last increased in 2012 by 0.6 mills.

Police- Animal Control, Crime Prevention, Patrol, Investigations, DARE, Emergency Services, and Information Technology

Public Works- Operation and maintenance of drainage system, streets, buildings and grounds, swimming pool, tennis courts, parks, and vehicles

Community Development- Building Permits, Code Enforcement, and Solid Waste Management

Administration- Mayor and Council support, Management and Planning, Financial Management, Human Resources, Business Licensing, and Animal Licensing

In 2021, the average market value of a Prairie Village home is \$380,419. In 2021, on average, a homeowner will pay \$70 each month for City services. The breakdown below illustrates how this amount is divided among various City programs.

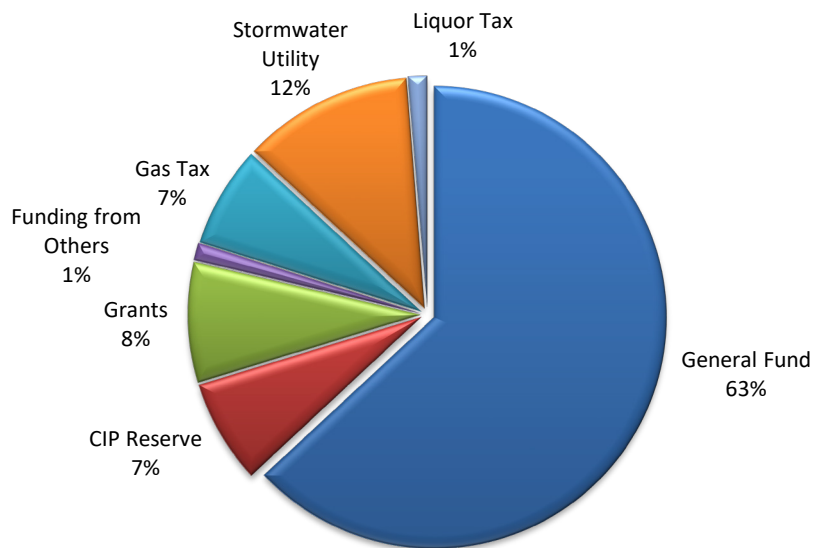
CAPITAL INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM

The City maintains a four-year Capital Infrastructure Program (CIP) to aid the City Council and staff in planning and budgeting for the City's infrastructure needs. The CIP is reviewed and updated each year during the budget process. The majority of the funding for the CIP comes from the General Fund. Other funding sources include bond proceeds, the gas tax, the stormwater utility fee, grants, participation by neighboring cities and 1/3 of the liquor tax which is required to be spent on parks and recreation programs.

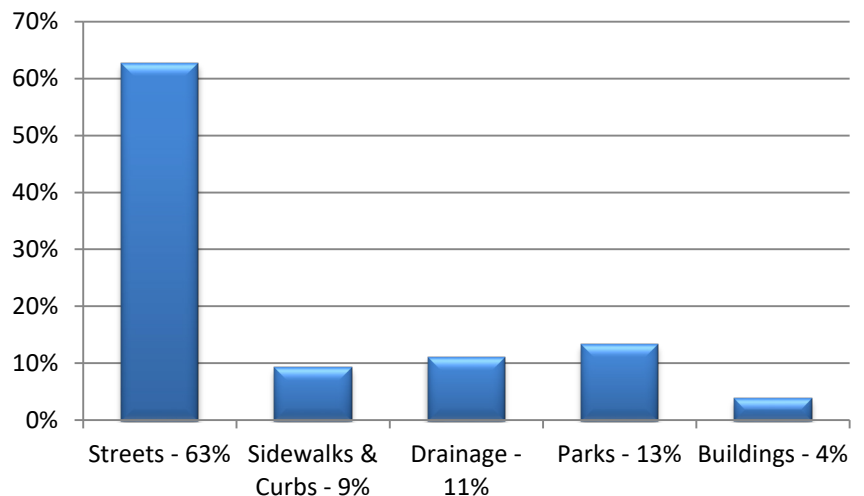
The CIP is divided into five sections:

- Parks-** Includes plans for redevelopment and replacement of existing park structures and materials.
- Drainage-** Includes plans for replacement of components of the City's storm drainage system.
- Streets-** Includes plans for major improvements that extend the life of the City's street system.
- Buildings-** Includes plans for replacement or major improvements that extend the life of the City's buildings.
- Sidewalks & Curbs-** Includes plans for replacement or major improvements that extend the life of the City's sidewalk and curb system. Also includes plans for additions to the system to comply with the City's sidewalk policy or ADA regulations.

Tips to help thwart porch pirates

With the holidays upon us and online shopping in its peak season, the Crime Prevention Unit would like to remind residents of ways to prevent being a victim of package theft crimes committed by “Porch Pirates.” Porch Pirates are people who drive residential streets and steal delivered

packages from a porch or front door area. Here are some ways to prevent Porch Pirates from stealing your holiday gifts:

- Have your package delivered to a secure location (FedEx office, Amazon pick-up);
- Schedule delivery for weekends or after-hours;
- Have packages delivered to your work/office;
- Have a neighbor pick up your delivery;
- Send packages to a family/friend who is home during the day, or
- Install a doorbell camera.

Reserve a ball field

Ball fields in Prairie Village are always in demand. The City of Prairie Village allows reservations of ball fields for soccer, baseball, and softball practices.

Teams with majority of players who are Prairie Village residents or students will be given priority for field reservations, but any team may apply to reserve a field. Teams can reserve two practice times per week for up to 1½ hours. Fields are available in Porter, Franklin, Windsor, and Taliaferro Parks.

If your team reserved a field during 2021, your coach should have received a 2022 application form via email. You may also obtain one at the City Clerk’s Office inside City Hall, 7700 Mission Road, or online at www.pvkansas.com. Applications for the spring season are due January 14.

Holiday tree disposal

When the holidays have come and gone, and it’s time to un-deck the halls, Prairie Village residents have multiple options for live tree disposal.

Republic Services will pick up live trees at the curbside for the first two weeks in January 2022. Trees taller than 6 feet must be cut in half prior to removal. The trees will be picked up with other compost/yard waste items on each resident’s typical trash pickup date.

Additionally, the City sponsors a tree recycling program which runs from December 23, 2021 to January 16, 2022. Trees can be placed in designated areas of Porter, Franklin, and Taliaferro Parks. Trees must be free of all lights, ornaments, stands, metal nails, etc. as these items will damage the chipping machine. Residents may take the chips for their own use.

Police to team up with local students for Shop With A Cop

The eleventh annual Shop With A Cop event will be held in December. Sponsored by the Prairie Village Foundation, Shop With A Cop is a chance for the Prairie Village Police Department to team up with deserving elementary school children in our community.

Each year for the last ten years, the Police Department has

hosted ten children identified by school principals, counselors and the Police Department’s D.A.R.E. officer. Once again this year, police officers will take children holiday shopping and pay for their purchases. Children may buy gifts for both themselves and family members. After shopping, each child is treated to dinner and

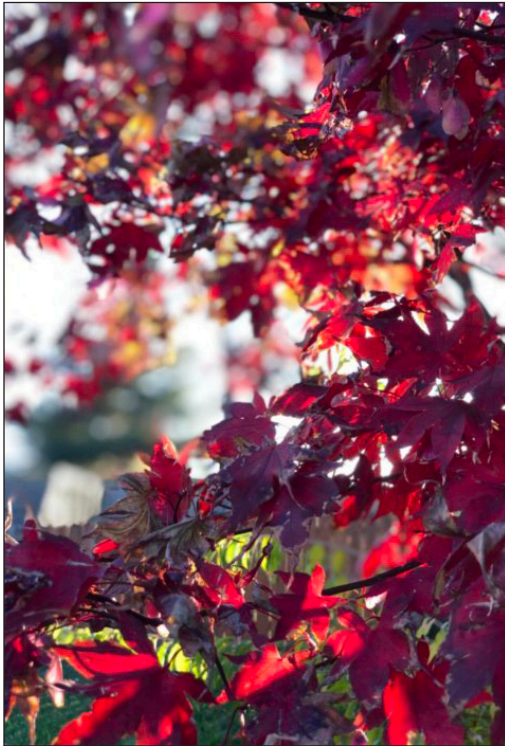

Leaf removal requires team effort

The arrival of fall means millions of leaves are falling from trees in the city. For Public Works, this kicks off an intense effort to remove leaves from the streets, drain inlets, channels, parks, and islands.

Streets - The City has one street sweeper, and it operates daily throughout the fall. The street sweeper's primary purpose is not to remove leaves from the street, and it is important that residents attempt to keep as many leaves out of the street as possible. While we do pick up leaves in locations where there are drainage concerns, we will bypass areas if residents have piled significant amounts of leaves along the curb line. Please note, Public Works does not take sweeping requests.

Drain Inlets - Public Works crews make special efforts to clear the opening of street drain inlets when heavy rain is projected. City Code prohibits placing leaves into the

drain inlet or into the curb or street.

Channels - Public Works crews patrol the channels to remove blockages. Again, please note City Code prohibits placing leaves or any debris into the channel.

Parks and Islands - The Public Works mowing crews remove leaves from parks and islands on a rotating schedule until weather prohibits these activities. This activity continues in the winter months if there is no snow. With more than 60 acres of parks and more than 200 islands, it can take significant time to complete all these areas.

Leaf removal in Prairie Village is a significant effort for everyone. We appreciate all that residents do to remove leaves from their individual properties. If we each do our part, the sheer magnitude of this effort is minimized while keeping the drainage system functional and enhancing the water quality in our streams.
