Take Care of Your Neighborhood Mail Carriers!

As we were all reminded with the heavy snowfall last month, winter weather can mean slippery surfaces for both you and your

mail carrier.

Inclement weather may cause mail delivery service to be delayed or curtailed because of hazardous conditions such as snow buildup or snow and ice on sidewalks, porches or steps. Also, mail carriers are not allowed to dismount for curbline boxes or cluster boxes that are blocked by snow and ice buildup. To prevent mail delivery service from being delayed or curtailed, please ensure mail carriers have proper access to mail receptacles when snow arrives. This means removing large accumulations of snow from the area approximately six feet on both sides of the mailbox or cluster box.

If these precautions are taken, then you can feel good knowing that both your mail carrier and your mail are safe.

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

As the holiday season comes to a close, I continue to be honored to serve as your mayor and am enthusiastic about the upcoming New Year. As always, I am particularly proud of our community's generosity and willingness to help our neighbors in need.

Over the past few months the citizens of Prairie Village have undertaken two significant efforts to help those in our community that need assistance. In October, the **21st Annual Peanut Butter Week** event provided 5,600 pounds of peanut butter and over \$1,100 in cash contributions to Harvesters Community Food Network.

On November 28th the lighting of the holiday trees on the Municipal Campus and at several other locations throughout the City kicked-off the holiday season in Prairie Village and the 20th year of the **Mayor's Holiday Tree Fund**. Since its inception, the Fund has provided over \$100,000 in assistance to Prairie Village residents who need help paying their utility bills or with making repairs to their homes. In 2005, Prairie Village residents and business owners contributed nearly \$10,000 to the Holiday Tree Fund.

When efforts such as these are combined with the time, energy and financial assistance that Prairie Village residents contribute individually to churches, synagogues, and charitable organizations, it is truly remarkable the positive impact our city can make.

I would like to remind everyone that needs exist throughout the year, not just during the holiday season. As you're making your new year's resolutions, let's resolve to make helping those less fortunate than ourselves a year-round endeavor.

Johnson County Emergency Management & Homeland Security Encourages All Citizens to Purchase an NOAA All Hazards Radio

As the news has shown us through the recent events in Indiana and Kentucky, severe weather, including tornadoes, can happen at any time of the year. Through the use of sirens, communities can be alerted to severe weather in a timely manner. Yet, these sirens have been manufactured to warn people who are outdoors, not for individuals who are indoors. To increase the potential for awareness of the impending weather, another option is available. This option, known as an NOAA All Hazards Radio, is a safety tool that ensures direct access to information on severe weather and other types of emergencies. Whether it's an approaching tornado, roads overrun by flash floods, or a need to be on the lookout for an abducted child, the radio sounds an immediate alarm. The NOAA All Hazards Radio will signal any danger, 24 hours a day, seven days

a week, either on a national or local level, and recommend safety steps.

You can program your radio to sound alerts to your preferences. For example, if your area is inclined to tornadoes or flash floods, you can program the radio to alert you to these types of warnings in your county and surrounding area.

2006 Animal Licensing

City ordinance requires the annual licensing of all cats and dogs residing in the City. The ordinance also requires proof of a current rabies vaccination. Now is the time to license your dog or cat for the 2006 licensing year.

NOTE: The vaccination does not have to be valid throughout the calendar year, but must be valid at the time of licensing. **Therefore, all pets can be licensed in january and february** before late fees are assessed. The license fee for a spayed or neutered pet is \$6. The fee for an animal that has not been spayed or neutered is \$12.



Safety and Security Tips for Seniors

I recently had the pleasure of speaking with several Senior Citizen groups about crime prevention. During the

presentation I shared several tips specifically for seniors that I wanted to share with the senior citizens and others in our community.

- Before leaving home, and when retiring for the evening, check and make sure your home's doors and windows are locked.
- Get to know your neighbors and help look out for each other.
- Do not allow anyone in your home that you do not know and trust.
- Store valuables in a safety deposit box or in a locked and secure place in your home.
- If you are going out, be sure to take a friend with you whenever possible.
- Do not carry large amounts of money on your person.
- Be aware of your surroundings and walk with confidence.
- Beware of con artists and any offers that sound "too good to be true".

Common sense precautions, being aware of your surroundings and knowing your limitations are all good safety practices that hopefully will make you a safer senior this new year.
