CODES CORNER - Holiday Light Safety

Once again the holiday season is upon us, bringing with it festive electrical decorations and lighting. We may all enjoy a safe and attractive season by following some basic rules for electrical safety.

Outdoor holiday lighting should be checked for exposed or frayed wires. Damaged lights or extension cords should be replaced with new ones. All exterior lights or displays should be plugged into a Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) type outlet. These are the outlets found in most bathrooms and kitchens, with the red and black push buttons.

Extension cords are one of the leading causes for electrical fires in the United States. They are designed for temporary use only. When purchasing new cords, look for the size of the cord on the label. The lower the numerical gauge of the wire, the greater the wire's capacity for safely carrying electricity. The minimum recommended gauge is number 14.

A few simple rules about extension cords:

- Cords should be unplugged when left unattended.
- Avoid pinching cords in doors and windows.
- Coiling electrical cords into neat bundles may hide slack in the cord. However, a coiled cord may increase the risk of fire.
- Resist the temptation to run extension cords under carpets, rugs, furniture, etc.

Decorative lighting and displays should be taken down as soon as reasonable following the holiday. Most of these products are not designed for long term exposure to sun and rain, and they will last you many more years if removed after the season. Feel free to call the Codes Administration Department at 913/381-6464 if you have any questions regarding holiday lighting or other electrical safety issues.

2009 Animal Licensing

City Ordinance requires the annual licensing of all cats and dogs residing in the City. The ordinance also requires proof of a current rabies vaccination. You may begin licensing your pets for the 2009 year at the City Clerk's office after December 15th.

NOTE: The rabies vaccination does not have to be new, but must be valid at the time of licensing. Therefore, all pets can be licensed in January and February before late fees are assessed. The license fee for a spayed or neutered pet is \$6. You will need to provide proof that the animal is spayed or neutered to be eligible for the \$6 fee. This information is found on your rabies vaccination certificate. The NEW fee for an animal that has not been spayed or neutered is \$25.

Stormwater Utility Fee will be applied to 39,029,700 impervious square feet on 9,645 properties

Stormwater Management

One of the services the City of Prairie Village provides is stormwater This is accomplished through the construction and maintenance of a stormwater management system comprised of curbs, gutters, inlets, pipes, and drainage channels located both under and aboveground throughout the city. The City Public Works Department is responsible for maintenance of the city stormwater management system. Because Prairie Village is fully developed, the city stormwater management infrastructure is largely in place. Current estimates place the value of this system at nearly \$25 million.

In August this year, the City Council created a Stormwater Utility Fee in order to provide a stable and non-discriminatory funding for the city stormwater management activities. Shortly, property owners in Prairie Village will be receiving their tax bills for 2009. On this bill will be a new line called Stormwater Utility Fee. The tax authority identification number listed for this fee is 261PVCSTMW. All properties, single family residential, multi-family residential, commercial properties, schools, churches and government owned properties will pay a Stormwater Utility Fee. The fee is based on the amount of impervious area on a parcel of property. The fee is \$0.037 per square foot of impervious surface.

Top Ten Wish List

This holiday season I have made up a wish list of 10 Crime Prevention tips that I hope residents will keep in mind for the holidays and the coming year.

- 1 Lock the windows and doors on your home when you leave, even if it's for a few minutes.
- 2 Do not put large displays of holiday gifts in view of your windows.
- 3 If you are going out of town for the holidays, use an automatic timer for your home's lights.
- 4 Record the serial numbers of expensive items such as electronics and keep them on a list you can refer back to in the event the items are stolen.
- 5 Lock your car even if you're gone for a few minutes, and lock your shopping packages in your trunk.

- **6** Avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Pay for purchases with a debit, credit or gift card.
- 7 Notify issuers immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.
- 8 Stay alert to your surroundings and the people around you, especially when in parking lots.
- 9 After the holidays don't advertise what new items you have in your home. Flatten empty boxes down and place them at the curb in a trash receptacle.
- 10 Be a "Nosy Neighbor" and watch out for suspicious activity in your neighborhood. Call the police immediately if suspicious activity is observed.
