75th Street Corridor Study Update September and October Workshops to be Rescheduled

The City of Prairie Village appreciates the individuals who provided input at the public workshops or through email correspondence. The June Workshop Series provided a great deal of valuable insight, information and ideas about the potential of this significant corridor. Some of the many ideas generated include: looking at ways to make the 75th Street corridor more pedestrian friendly; making the corridor more public transit oriented; finding ways to connect 75th Street to existing Prairie Village shopping centers (Prairie Village, Corinth and HyVee Shopping Centers); finding ways to make the corridor greener with additional street tree plantings and developing ways to make the 75th Street corridor express the identity and attributes we all value about the City of Prairie Village.

As we move forward in developing a guide plan for future generations, it will be important that we take adequate time to explore all of the ideas, concepts, and expectations which were suggested during this initial stage of the study process. Before we move forward to the next stage of the study, the City believes that it is critical that we take a more detailed look at



each of the ideas and concepts generated. Gaining a complete understanding of these issues will be very important in developing a guide plan which will enable us to keep this corridor vital through the next thirty years.

Because of the need for additional time to study all of the ideas, the meetings originally set for this September and October will be rescheduled. The City is committed to developing a guide plan which enables this important corridor to be an asset to Prairie Village. As we establish a new timeline for the additional public meetings, we will keep you informed through the Village Voice, public notices and the City's website www.pvkansas.com. Mayor's Message

Many residents contacted me and other City officials regarding the Meadowbrook project. We appreciate the interest and comments from concerned Prairie Village residents.

On July 28th, after much deliberation, the City Council approved the rezoning of the Meadowbrook golf course to mixed-use zoning to enable the retention of the country club and development of a senior housing facility and condominium units.

In arriving at their decision, the Council listened to the views of the residents and the unanimous recommendation of the Planning Commission. Their recommendation was forwarded after almost two years of discussion and deliberation with the applicant. This zoning designation change is just one of the steps in the process. Additional steps include Planning Commission review of final development plan and building plan review.

Many of the concerns related to the recent mailer sent to nearly every address in Prairie Village. The mailer was marked "Official Notification" below the sender of: Meadowbrook Neighborhood Alliance. This was not an "Official Notification" from the City and we apologize if you were led to believe it was.

As one would expect from all the good neighbors of Prairie Village, the response to this mailer was overwhelming as residents wanted to be properly informed. The City Council members and I were inundated by your questions, comments and concerns this mailer created. We responded as best we could to your comments and concerns.

It is unfortunate that this "Official Notification" was taken as official City correspondence. We understand why our Prairie Village residents would be concerned, considering the panic nature and misinformation represented in the mailer. Once we became aware of the flyer, we tried to address the concerns and verify the information related to the Meadowbrook rezoning and development plan.

The applicant has indicated they will be requesting public financing for portions of the project. As the developer moves forward, the review and discussion of public incentives will be held in a public forum and residents will have opportunity to share your thoughts. You can be assured that all issues of this project will receive the highest order of attention among the city staff and City Council. We will keep you informed of the accurate facts and details of each issue.

Do you need to get rid of your old computer, stereo, scanner or personal printer? If so, the City of Prairie Village will be hosting an Electronics Recycling Event.

Electronics Recycling Day Oct. 25, 2008 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Shawnee Mission East High School parking lot

Residents can bring their unwanted electronics to this collection event. Some of the collected equipment will be inspected, reconditioned and reused whenever possible. Obsolete or non-working equipment will be disassembled and the components recycled.

Why is it important to recycle your electronics? Electronic devices can contain significant amounts of hazardous or toxic substances. Cathode ray tubes found in most computer monitors and TVs contain significant amounts of lead while other equipment may contain mercury, cadmium, chromium and other heavy metals. When electronic devices are disposed of these pollutants may pose environmental risks.

There is no charge to recycle computer keyboards, computer mice, cell phones, CD players, or personal printers.
