75th Street Corridor Study

The City of Prairie Village kickedoff its first public workshop on the 75th Street Corridor Study on April 22nd. Over 100 individuals came and participated by sharing their ideas and visions for 75th Street. Many of the participants took a tour of key intersections and noted positive and negative characteristics of the corridor. After the tour, the participants broke into smaller groups which looked at issues related to the types of uses individuals would like to see along the corridor, transportation ideas/ concerns, pedestrian connectivity, visual enhancement ideas, and then overall general visions for the corridor. Some of the ideas generated included: having more retail options serve as centers of interest or destination locations, bury utility lines, provide bike lanes, connect into transit through neighboring

communities, and add new trees along street. You can see all of the ideas generated at the workshop at www.villagevision75.com.

HNTB Corporation, the consultant selected to assist with the study, will take the ideas and develop plan alternative concepts for areas along the corridor. These concepts will be presented at three separate public workshops:

Tuesday, June 17, 2008, 7-9 p.m. Thursday, June 19, 2008, 7-9 p.m. Saturday, June 21, 2008, 9-11 a.m.

All of the workshops will take place at Asbury United Methodist Church in Hager Hall (5400 West 75th Street). We hope you will be able to attend one of the workshops to continue vision and help determine the future of this important corridor. CODE CORNER

Summer is here and people are out and about walking, running, playing, working in the yard and enjoying the weather. Please review the following City codes and help keep your property and our City clean, safe, and attractive for all.

- Keep trees healthy with regular pruning to remove any dead, broken or overgrown limbs and remove any limb debris which has fallen into the yard. Trees that are dead need to be removed.
- Check trees and shrubs regularly to ensure they do not protrude into the City street or hang low and impede traffic. Limbs must be at least 14 ft over the street.
- Property owners are required to maintain the sidewalks in front of their property free from any debris which may fall upon them. Please check sidewalks regularly and remove any debris which has fallen upon on them.
- Also check to make sure shrubs & trees do not protrude into the sidewalk and limbs are at least 9ft high over the sidewalk. Please help to keep our sidewalks pedestrian friendly and safe.
- City ordinance requires that grass, including weeds and grass in and along the sidewalk, right of way, and curbing, be maintained to 8" or less. Any noxious weeds such as poison ivy are to be removed.
- Maintain easements and drainage channels free from over grown thickets, brush, weeds and grass, leaves or any other debris. Overgrown vegetation can attract insects and vermin.
- One female mosquito can lay 100-300 eggs at a time in just a small amount of standing water, and eggs may hatch within 7 to 12 days. Please check and eliminate stagnate water in areas such as gutters, buckets, bird baths, small swimming pools or any other receptacle that water may stagnate in. - Make sure trash cans are secured with lids, stored behind the front building line out of public view, not set out until the night before pickup and returned to a proper storage area after pick up.
- Trailers, RV's, and boats may not be parked or stored in the front yard setback.
- Vehicles must be legally licensed and in an operable condition.

Exterior Home Grant Program

The Prairie Village Exterior Grant Program has begun and the City has approved 12 grants and has only a limited number of remaining grants available. To qualify you must be in one of three eligible areas (see http://www.pvkansas.com/codes/ExteriorGrantProgram.shtml), a minimum of \$5,000 invest is required to be eligible. The grants range from \$1,000 to \$2,500 and are awarded as a 20% reimbursement of eligible total costs of construction and/or materials. Home Security Matters

While I was recently reviewing some police reports I noticed similarities in some of the burglary reports. I noted some doors and windows were left unlocked, some alarm systems were not activated and a few homes were not properly illuminated.

While you are performing your spring cleaning be sure to take a look at your home like a burglar might do, and try to make your home more resistant to an intruder. I have listed a security check list which may assist you as you take on this important task.

It is okay to take on an "Us against Them" attitude when it comes to home security and your personal safety because home security really does matter.

- Examine your front and back door locks and make sure they are properly working. The doors are a burglar's most common means of entry.
- Know that a solid core door, not a hollow core door, is more resistant to forced entry.
- Replace a push button knob lock with a deadbolt lock to add more resistance.
- Many homes have double hung windows which can be "pinned" by installing a pin in the lower window sash.
- Keep your garage door closed when the garage is unattended.
- An open garage door is an open invitation for any thief.
- Illuminate the exterior entrances to your home. No burglar wants to be illuminated as they walk around a home.

If you plan on heading out of town and will be away from your home for even a few days, be sure to let a trusted neighbor or friend know so they can attend to your home. Their duties may include picking up newspapers, mail or even turning on different lights inside of your home. Questions or concerns?
