The grants range from \$1,000 to \$2,500 and are awarded as a 20% reimbursement of the total costs of construction and/ or materials. Reduce and Recycle Paper

Do you know that Americans discard enough office paper every year to build a 12-foot high wall stretching from New York to San Francisco? According to the Natural Capitalism Foundation, the average office worker uses 10,000 sheets of copy paper annually. When paper decomposes in a landfill, it releases methane gas, a high pollutant.

So how do we reduce waste and recycle used paper? Spread the word that increasing our efficiency in handling paper will increase profits for businesses and save money for city administrations and its residents. Some easy ways to reduce paper waste and recycle include:



- 1. Set photocopiers and printers to print on both sides of paper by default. This can save you and/or your company both paper and dollars.
- 2. Make computer files instead of paper files wherever possible. Many free or inexpensive software programs such as Stickies or NoteWhen reduce the need for note pads and sticky notes. Electronic files save floor and file space, and most electronic documents are safer than paper.
- 3. Reduce junk mail. Just return the mailing label to the company and request that it remove your name from its mailing list. The Federal Trade Commission website on unsolicited mail gives directions on how to remove your business from unwanted mail, www.ftc.gov/bcp/edu/pubs/consumer/alerts/alt063.pdf.
- 4. Reuse paper from junk mailings as note pads beside the telephone.
- 5. Reuse paper that you save and can use on only one side.
- 6. Reuse envelopes to send mail whenever possible. Use labels to cover old addresses on used envelopes. A number of companies, such as Northern Sun, Save a Tree Labels, sell reusable labels which includes a discrete message that the envelope was reused to save trees.
- 7. Reuse packing materials.
- 8. Select products from suppliers that use minimal packaging.
- 9. Start a recycling program for your office.
- 10. Residents can always utilize their city's recycling service.

Code Corner

Spring is just around the corner and it's time to start cleaning up from the winter, preparing for the rainy season, and thinking about those Spring projects around your homes and yards.

The following are a few tips to help keep your property and neighborhoods safe, attractive and in compliance with City Property Codes.

- Remove fallen limb debris. Limbs will be picked up with regular trash pick up under the following conditions:
 - Less than 4 ft. in length
 - Less than 4 inches in diameter
 - Tied into bundles weighing less than 60 lbs.
- Remove leaf debris from your yard.
 Please help to keep our drainage channels clean and flowing by removing any debris from the curbing channel and drainage inlets in front of your property.
- Check gutters and downspouts to make sure they are cleaned out, securely attached, free from rust, and functioning properly. (It's a good idea to check the runoff flow from downspouts and sump pumps to ensure they will not cause problems to your property or your neighbors.)
- Water may not be discharged onto any City sidewalk or street. Check the location and runoff from sump pumps or buried down spouts.
- Check your house, windows, garage and shed for peeling paint, rotting wood, rust or any other deterioration which needs paint, repair, or replacement.
- If you're thinking about a remodeling or building project please check with the Building Codes Department to see if a permit is required. You may access a list of projects that require permits at www.pvkansas.com or call 913-381-6464.

Work Place Safety and Self Protection

While away from home and at your place of employment it may be easy to forget about crime prevention and safety awareness. When in a work environment having left the comforts of home, thoughts and ideas may be about deadlines, budgets and bottom lines. This month's article addresses safety in the workplace as you go out into the business world and take on the challenges of the world.

- Make sure you keep an eye on your belongings which includes wallets, purses, blackberry, cell phones and laptops. Lock up items of value.
- Be attentive to people who enter your work environment who you do not recognize or who look out of place.
- Have emergency phone numbers readily available for immediate use and have a plan of action in place in case of an emergency.
- If you are the first employee to arrive at work, be attentive to your surroundings.
- When working after regular business hours, lock the entrance to your office to keep out uninvited visitors and let someone know you're working late
- If you are using an elevator or stairwell try to use them with people you know.

 with purpose. This may signal to criminals that you are aware of your
 surroundings.
