

MEADOWLAKE PARK RAIN GARDEN PROJECT

Earlier this year, the City accepted a request to be included in one of the Mid-America Regional Council's (MARC) rain garden workshops. As part of the World Environmental and Water Resources Congress a rain garden workshop was held at Meadowlake Park, located at 2900 W. 79th Street. One component of the workshop was creating two rain garden areas within the park. The rain gardens transformed a water issue into a functional and beautiful area within the park.

Rain gardens are a beautiful way to improve water quality in our lakes and streams. Catching

water in a rain garden allows it to slowly filter into the ground. This means less rainwater ends up in our storm sewers, which also means there is less flooding and erosion in our streams.

Rain gardens are also one of the approved Best Management Practices for the City of Prairie Village Stormwater Utility Fee Credit Policy. Take a walk through one of our beautiful Prairie Village parks and you will almost certainly hear the childrens' laughter. If you are like me, it will be a bit contagious! And why not laugh?

Busy lives. Financial challenges. Employment pressures. Parenting.

Aging. You name it; we are all entitled to some laughter. And your Prairie Village parks welcome you!

To keep all of you abreast of the latest happenings in your parks, I wanted to update you on a few items. The Village Vision Strategic Investment Plan charges the Parks and Recreation Committee with creating a master plan to enhance our parks and recreational programming over the next 10-15 years. Thanks to many volunteers serving on the ad-hoc Parks Master Plan committee, along with our Parks & Recreation committee members, a plan has now been adopted by the City Council. The plan was developed following many months of public input including surveys and workshops. Resident participation in creating this long range plan was significant and we are now ready to begin implementation!

With 11 city parks, this clearly will be a long range plan. The committee felt it was important to kick-off the plan by placing new park identification signs in each of our parks. These signs are expected to be completed this fall and installed shortly thereafter. In addition to park signage, the top priority was to continue exploring the feasibility of a community center. The City Council has budgeted funds and plans are underway for a study.

Design and engineering work will begin on Franklin Park, followed by Schliffke Park and then Weltner Park. Two more parks will follow: Porter and Bennett. These five parks were selected to jumpstart the master plan. All 11 parks will be upgraded. I encourage you to take a look at the Parks Master Plan on the City's website. I think you will be interested in the plans for your neighborhood park!

We will do our best to keep you updated on these plans as they come closer to being started. Please know you are welcome to attend our monthly committee meetings, the second Wednesday, 7:00 p.m., City Hall. Sit and listen to the discussion, or share your thoughts during Public Participation.

Finally, one of the reasons I was so impressed with our consultant, Doug Pickert, Indigo Designs, was his approach to park planning by returning us to nature. I think you will be excited to see the nature play areas that will be incorporated into our community's park system. When Doug mentioned during a public workshop that kids really have no place to/or just plain don't play hide & seek anymore, I took that to heart. It's time to bring ALL of us back to nature and playtime! Remember waiting for that recess bell? Can you hear the laughter? See you in our parks!


NOVEMBER

How do I dispose of Leaves?

When Fall arrives, leaf raking season begins. The City once again reminds you to properly dispose of your leaves. Here are several options: **DO:**

- Mulch If the leaves in your yard aren't too deep, you can simply mow over them with a mulching mower, returning the clippings to your lawn.
- Compost Leaves are an important ingredient in any compost pile. For more information about the City's composting regulations, contact Marcia Gradinger at 913-385-4605 or email to mgradinger@pvkansas.com.
- Rake and Bag When you rake leaves, bag them and place them
 them at the curb for collection on the same day as your regular
 household trash and recycling. Use paper bags for your leaves.

DON'T

- Don't rake leaves into the street this can clog up the storm drains and may create a traffic hazard.
- Don't rake leaves into creeks or drainage channels this can cause drainage problems. Besides, it's against the law.

Leaves are beautiful...when they're on trees. Once they fall to the ground, they should be disposed of properly.




2010 Budget City of Prairie Village

The annual budget serves as a financial plan, provides guidance to City staff and communicates the City's financial condition. Most importantly, it presents the Governing Body's vision for the community by describing how public funds will be spent to achieve policy objectives.

Revenues continue to be relatively stable resulting in a small overall increase over the 2009 Budget.



Goals & Objectives for the 2010 Budget

- Maintain the quality of level of
- Ensure items in the budget have a sustainable budget impact.
- Expenditures should be less than or equal to revenues.
- Attend to infrastructure needs.
- Be mindful of the tax burden.
- Maintain the same mill levy rate.
- Continue implementation of goals contained in The Village Vision.

Property Tax: Tax on real estate and personal property. It is computed by applying the City's mill rate to the City's assessed valuation.

Sales Tax: Tax comes from two sources: Local Sales Tax and County Sales Tax.

Franchise Fees: Franchise fees are charged on major utilities within the City. The fee is 5% of gross receipts as defined and permitted by state statutes.

Charges for Services: Includes revenue which is a charge for contract service and special assessments to recipients of certain services.

Intergovernmental: Includes revenues granted through other jurisdictions, primarily the County and State governments.

Other Revenues: Includes use tax, motor vehicle tax, liquor tax, license & permits, recreation fees, fines, interest income and miscellaneous revenue.

How are your Property Taxes used?

Your property tax bill is divided between several entities of which the City is only 16%.









The 2010 budget does not include a mill levy rate increase. The mill levy rate was last increased in 2008 by 2.0 mills.





Capital Infrastructure Program

The City maintains a four-year Capital Infrastructure Program (CIP) to aid the City Council and staff in planning and budgeting for the City's infrastructure needs. The CIP is reviewed and updated each year during the budget process. The majority of the funding for the CIP comes from the General Fund. Other funding sources include the gas tax, the stormwater utility fee, grants/participation in county programs and 1/3 of the liquor tax which is required to be spent on parks and recreation programs.



The CIP is divided into five sections.

Streets

Includes plans for repair and replacement of major improvements that extend the life of the City's street system.

Sidewalks & Curbs

Includes plans for repair and replacement or major improvements that extend the life of the City's sidewalk and curb system. Also includes plans for additions to the system to comply with the City's sidewalk policy or ADA regulations.

Drainage


Includes plans for repair and replacement of components of the City's storm drainage system.

Parks

Includes plans for park enhancements and replacement of existing park structures and materials.

Buildings


Includes plans for repair and replacement or major improvements that extend the life of the City's buildings.

Save on Prescription Drugs



The City of Prairie Village has a new program to offer savings on prescription drugs to residents who are without health insurance, a traditional benefits plan, or have prescriptions that are not covered by insurance. The Prescription Discount Card is made available to residents by the City of Prairie Village with the National League of Cities (NLC) and is made possible through the City of Prairie Village's membership in NLC.

Increase in Park & **Community Center Fees**

There are new rates to rent a Park Pavilion and Community Center in 2010. The new rates are:

Park Pavilions:

\$8 per hour – Prairie Village residents or business owners \$15 per hour – Non-residents

Community Center:

\$12 per hour – Multiple Use Reservations (3 or more at a time)

\$15 per hour – Weekday Reservations

\$20 per hour – Weekend Reservations

If you will be having amplified sound at your event, an amplified sound permit is required. For more details about renting facilities, contact the City Clerk's Department at 913-381-6464.

Animal Licensing Changes

Based on suggestions from residents and the implementation of a new licensing software that will give the City Clerk's Department more capacity, the animal licensing requirements are changing. The licensing year will be changing from calendar based to rabies vaccination based. If you have multiple animals that are vaccinated at different times, we will pick one of the dates and all of your animals will license at that time. We will be sending out notifications at least one month before your license renewal is due. Please wait to receive the notification before licensing your animal for 2010. We are also moving to a permanent tag. Animals that have 2 or 3 year rabies vaccinations may renew for 2 or 3 years. Prairie Village Real Estate Update – "Has our market stabilized yet?"

It is the question on a lot of Prairie Village residents' minds right now. As we watch the unpredictable stock market rise and fall, we wonder if the biggest investment for most Prairie Villager's, their home, is seeing the same volatility. I may not be the first, but let me be the loudest when I say "NO". Yes we have seen some settling of values in our area, however, our "micro-market" has not suffered the fate of many major markets.

For example, currently in PV we have approximately 4.7 months of inventory on the market. This means that it would take 4.7 months for all of the current listings to sell. What does this mean to you? The National Association of Realtors considers an annual average of 6 months to be a balanced market and less than 6 months to be a seller's market. A seller's market? Yes a seller's market? Crazy huh?

Now don't get me wrong. Historically, this is the best time to be a buyer in the last 50 years. Fortunately, our great city has

several benefits to soften the blow of the real estate slump for sellers as well. One benefit is that our average sales price for the last 90 days is approximately \$209,000. That is affordable housing! Also many first-time home buyers' can afford to buy in PV, and with the low interest rate and first time home buyer tax credit – why wouldn't they?

Weekly I am asked "Is our market recovering?" or, "When will we get back to normal?" The good news is that we are seeing signs of recovery right now. Inventory is down. Average days on the market is hovering around 90 days. The second answer is – this is the new normal. To clarify, it took years to get us into the current market, and it will take years to get us back. The good news for us is that our new normal is still quite good, comparatively speaking.

Police Department Assists Burden, KS Police Department



The City Council has historically recognized the importance of properly equipping and outfitting patrol cars in order to adequately respond to calls for service. We are very fortunate in comparison to some communities throughout Kansas who simply do not have the funds available for public safety. We would like to share a success story how our old equipment benefited one of those agencies. When Chief Travis Lowe of Burden, Kansas, began to examine the budget for the Burden Police Department, he discovered there was no money budgeted for repair or replacement of police vehicles, light bars, or other safety resources. Chief Lowe turned to the law enforcement community for help. He located two used Ford F-350 pickup trucks from a federal surplus near Denver, Colorado. Unfortunately, the vehicles were not equipped for law enforcement service. The City of Prairie Village came to his aid by donating used equipment to help outfit the vehicles from Denver.

A Chat About Coyotes

The City has received a number of phone calls from concerned residents regarding coyotes. These few simple measures will help to reduce the likelihood of contact.

- · Keep your bushes and yards trimmed
- Secure trash bins
- Clean under bird/squirrel feeders
- Clean up fruit that has fallen from trees
- Secure fruit and vegetable gardens
- · Close in compost piles
- · Close off crawl spaces under porches and decks
- Eliminate artificial water sources
- Don't feed pets outside
- And DO NOT intentionally feed coyotes

How Do You Stay Safe when Walking or Bicycling?

The increased popularity of walking, jogging, and bicycling is very prevalent throughout our community. We would like to remind everyone that traffic laws do apply to pedestrians and bicyclists. Our ultimate goal is to provide a safe environment for everyone to enjoy while sharing the roadway. Please take a few moments to review the following suggestions and tips to make your next trip on the roadway a little safer:

- Watch out for vehicles backing out of driveways or parking spaces.
 Drivers do not always see persons on foot or on bikes, especially in their blind spots.
- When walking, use sidewalks whenever possible. In the absence
 of sidewalks, walk facing traffic so you see vehicles and drivers see
 you. If walking with more than one person, form a single line upon
 approach of vehicles.
- When cycling, never ride against traffic; always ride in the same direction as the vehicles. Motorists are not looking for bikes riding on the wrong side of the roadway.
- Whether riding or walking, cross at intersections whenever possible.
- When crossing intersections, make eye contact with the driver, never assume they see you.
- Pay attention to turning vehicles, especially those turning right on red lights or at stop signs.
- If you walk and listen to music, remain observant of traffic around you.
- Stay visible after dark. Wear bright or reflective clothing. If cycling at night, always use a head light and tail light for visibility.
- Always let someone know when and where you are going and how long you plan to be gone.
- When riding, obey all regulatory signs and traffic lights. It is not only safer for the cyclist but it's State Law.
- Always wear a helmet when you ride. Helmets dramatically reduce the risk of head injury in a bicycle accident.
- Carry a cell phone in case of emergencies.

Need To Get Rid Of Your Old Computer?

Or even a TV, stereo, scanner or personal printer? If so, come to the city's annual e-recycling event co-sponsored with the City of Overland Park and Leawood. Residents can bring their unwanted electronics to this collection event. There is no charge to recycle computer CPUs, keyboards, mice, VCRs, stereos, scanners and personal printers. Charges of \$10 to \$25 will apply to computer monitors (flat panel monitors are free), televisions and large printers.

To recycle 10 or more computers, contact Surplus Exchange at 816-472-0444 to schedule a pickup at your location.

Some of the collected equipment will be inspected, reconditioned and reused whenever possible. Obsolete or non-working equipment will be disassembled and the components recycled. All electronics collected by the city are handled by companies that are certified by the Basel

Action Network.
