Property tax rebate program accepting applications Jan. 9

As part of the 2023 budget process, the Governing Body has again allocated \$20,000 from the City's budget to a property tax rebate program designed to alleviate some of the burden of home ownership due to rising property values. Qualified residents will be reimbursed 100% of the City's portion of property taxes, excluding special assessments.

Eligibility requirements:

Only property owners that are Prairie Village residents living in owner-occupied homes, are current on payment of their property taxes and special assessments and meet the income guidelines are eligible for the program. For 2023, income guidelines have been increased in an effort to assist a larger number of residents. Please note that the guidelines are based on total 2021 income, not adjusted gross income.

Eligible applicants must also live in a home that is appraised by the county at or below the previous year's average property value in the City (in 2022, this amount was \$426,865).

Application instructions:

The City Clerk's office will begin accepting applications at 10 a.m. on Monday, January 9, 2023, on a first-come, first-served basis. Applicants will be required to submit proof of their 2021 income for all household members (i.e., tax return and/or social security statement). The types of income that must be reported are available at pvkansas.com/propertytaxrebate.

Applications must be delivered in-person to Prairie Village City Hall. Refunds will be distributed as funds allow to eligible applicants in the order in which applications were received.

A Message from the Mayor



Dear friends and neighbors,

Transitioning to 2023, let's take a moment to reflect back on highlights of an extraordinary 2022, as we anticipate great things ahead.

Back In-Person. 2022 was the year Prairie Village, along with much of the rest of the world, emerged from the pandemic. Our community began to reconnect in-person, enthusiastically seizing opportunities at traditional and new civic events such as VillageFest, JazzFest, Arts Fair, Holiday Tree Lighting, Juneteenth, Arts Council gallery shows, MLK celebration, PV Foundation charitable events,

Diversity forums, the swimming pool season, Ukrainian Sister City support, and Coffees with a Cop, socially filling our public spaces across Prairie Village again with laughter, learning and fun.

Fiscal Strength, Police, Roads and Staff Funding. Our local economy roared in 2022 as well with record economic activity, major commercial redevelopment investments, new local shop openings, and increased property values. We reconfirmed our best-in-class, triple AAA credit rating and again won an award for budget excellence and transparency, all while beating our budget. We approved the largest City property tax rate reduction in at least a generation and expanded our cash rebate programs for residents. We substantially increased police salaries and funding; made major infrastructure investment in roads, parks, and drainage; and rewarded our outstanding staff who kept it all humming.

Park Improvements, Sustainability. We expanded recycling programs, built new pedestrian and bike trails, and received the highest LEED Platinum environmental certification for our amazing new Public Works building. We installed new art, playgrounds, trees, restrooms, shelters and other amenities in our award-winning park system and adopted an ambitious new five-year capital plan for the future of those great parks.

2023. What lies ahead? We anticipate more upgrades to many of our parks in 2023, including the swimming pool. We will continue to seek input and consensus on unique Prairie Village answers to the question: Can we do more to address our housing cost and diversity challenges in ways that enhance long-term property values and strengthen our neighborhoods? We will consider additional improvements to our civic center campus, including City Hall, the Police Department, recreation and library facilities. We will undertake several major road and drainage improvement projects and continue to improve delivery of services including more online options.

As always, there is apprehension and uncertainty about the future. Fears of recession, inflation, partisan vitriol, new virus variants, lingering staffing challenges...pick your worry. None of these are new but they are all real threats to our quality of life, worthy of concern and planning.

A fundamental, historic path can continue to guide us to civic success. Some call it the "Prairie Village Way." If we each recommit to the greater good, share differences civilly as we seek common ground and truth, volunteer to help in good faith, and respect and celebrate our neighbors, then we will again overcome whatever adversity awaits. With your help, our Prairie Village star will shine, prosper and flourish in 2023 and beyond, more than ever before.

Dates to Note

Tree drop-off available until January 15

The holidays have come and gone, and it's time to un-deck the halls. Prairie Village residents have multiple options for live tree disposal.

Republic Services will pick up live trees at the curbside for the first two weeks in January. Trees taller than 6 feet must be cut in half prior to removal. The trees will be picked up with other compost/yard waste items on each resident's typical trash pickup date.

Additionally, the City sponsors a tree recycling program which runs until January 15. Trees can be placed in designated areas of Porter, Franklin, and Taliaferro Parks. Trees must be free of all lights, ornaments, stands, metal nails, etc. as these items will damage the chipping machine. Residents may take the chips for their own use.

Contractor licenses, building permits move online

The City of Prairie Village is transitioning to an online, cloud-based licensing and permitting system called OpenGov for contractor licensing and building permitting. The website is available online at prairievillageks.viewpointcloud.com.

All general contractor and sub-contractor licenses carry a single, flat fee of \$75, which can be paid online by credit card or through the mail via check. Licenses are issued for a 12-month period, beginning at the time of licensing and renewing 12 months later. Contractor licenses will not be processed until fees are paid and the contractor has an active Johnson County Contractor License.

Contractor licensing began online December 5, 2022. Permitting begins online January 3, 2023.

Small bulky item: Residents are allowed to set out one bulky item each month during the first full week of the month. Items cannot be larger than 2' by 2' and should weigh less than 45 pounds. For more information visit pvkansas.com/trash.









Licenses required for cats and dogs in Prairie Village

Do you own a cat or dog over the age of six months? If so, your pet must be licensed with the City. Licensing your furry friend helps keep them safe by ensuring they can be returned to their home if lost, and by certifying all animals in the City have rabies vaccinations. It's also inexpensive, with single-year licenses costing only \$6 for spayed or neutered animals.

Each Prairie Village household is permitted to have a maximum of four pets, with no more than three of one species (dog or cat). Licenses must be renewed every one, two or three years depending on the license purchased. Rabies vaccinations must also be valid for the duration of the license being purchased. If an animal cannot tolerate the rabies vaccination, a letter stating the intolerance must be provided by vour veterinarian.
