

Celebrate Independence Day at the City of Prairie Village's 27th Annual VillageFest Celebration on Tuesday, July 4. Activities are held on the Municipal Campus at 7700 Mission Road and in Harmon Park.

The festivities begin with a pancake breakfast hosted by Chris Cakes from 7:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. at the Harmon Park Pavilion. Breakfast is \$6 per person. The patriotic ceremony will be held at 8:30 a.m. with Kansas City Symphony Chorus member and Prairie Village resident Kristy Lambert singing the National Anthem followed by the presentation of the Community Spirit Awards.

Green Team recognized for Arbor Day

The Green Team, a group of more than 20 fourth to sixth grade students at Prairie Elementary School, was named 2023 Arbor Day honoree by the Prairie Village Tree Board. On April 29, many of the students and their parents gathered in Porter Park where a shagbark hickory was planted to honor the team.

Another Prairie Village Tree named State Champion

Prairie Village is now home to a Kansas State Champion English oak tree estimated at over 100 years old, dating back to the early part of the 20th century.

The tree is in the backyard of residents Lindsay and Skip Voitik and was measured in late April by Kim Bomberger of Kansas Forest Service, Prairie Village Urban Forestry Specialist Bridget Tolle, and members of the Prairie Village Tree Board.

The tree has a height of 74 feet; with a crown spread of 74 feet; and a circumference (measured 4.5 feet off the ground) of 12 feet, 5 inches.

The Voitik's were notified of the award in late May. Prairie Village now has six Kansas State Champion trees, second in Johnson County to Olathe's



seven Champion trees.

Johnson County, 28 Kansas State Champion trees has the most in the state of Kansas. There are 139 champion trees statewide. For more information, go to the Kansas Forest Service Champion Tree Report at kansasforests.org.




TOUCH-A-TRUCK
