

# CITY TO BEGIN VILLAGE VISION AMENDMENT PROCESS

With the closure of Mission Valley Middle School by the Shawnee Mission School District and the recent sale of the property to RED Development, the City Council has initiated a planning process to look at potential redevelopment uses of the former school site. The City's Comprehensive Plan, Village Vision, which provides guidance for land use decisions did not anticipate the closure of Mission Valley Middle School. The City has partnered with RED Development to conduct a public participation process which will solicit public feedback on potential redevelopment of the site. The community takes great pride in its tradition of strong organized planning efforts first established by J. C. Nichols and the City Council believes that it is important to continue this tradition as the community experiences changes.

The study area will include the former Mission Valley, Middle School site and the area north to 83rd Street from Mission Road to Somerset Drive. This will allow the community to provide feedback on this key area of the City. A number of focus groups and public meetings will be held in the coming months with many opportunities for residents to be involved in the process. The City has created a specific project page on its web site (www.pvkansas.com) which will provide updates about future meetings and how the planning process is progressing. Residents can sign up to receive updates when changes are made to this page so you can have the most up to date information. The public participation process will be completed in the fall and winter with an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan, Village Vision, anticipated in early March.



Prairie Village's annual State of the Arts gala event is quickly approaching and you definitely don't want to miss the festivities. #### **Geothermal Project**

You may have noticed quite a bit of construction at the Municipal Campus over the last month. The City has drilled a geothermal well field on the southeast corner of the Municipal Complex at 7700 Mission Rd. Thirty-two well holes measuring 6 inches in diameter and 400 feet deep were drilled and a 1 1/2 inch poly-pipe was placed in each hole. Beginning in mid-September, the Municipal Complex will begin the transition to geothermal heating and cooling. Lighting retrofits and water saving measures will be implemented as well.

The geothermal heat pump systems will be installed in City Hall, the Police Station and the Community Center and will save enough electricity and natural gas annually to be equivalent to any of the following:

- 1. Saving 33,484 gallons of gasoline
- 2. Removing 134 cars from the road
- 3. Preserving 277 acres of pine forests

In the summer, heat will be extracted from the building and pumped underground into the wells. Heat is absorbed from the warmer fluid by the cooler earth and cool fluid is returned to the building. In the winter, fluid that has cooled down is pumped back underground. Heat is absorbed from the warmer earth by the cooler fluid and the warm fluid is returned to the building.

## PUBLIC WORKS

### **Construction Update**

#### Construction continues on a number of projects throughout the fall.

- 1. Weltner Park / Cambridge Street Project includes street improvements along Cambridge Street from State Line Road to 79th Terrace and improvements to Weltner Park. The project includes sidewalk, curb, new asphalt construction and the realignment of Cambridge Street. The park improvements include an 8' wide park trail, a new park shelter and nature play features. The existing basketball and sand volleyball court will remain. The project is expected to be completed by November 1, 2011.
- 2. Nall Avenue: 75th to 79th Street is the City's 2011 CARS project and is 50% funded by Johnson County. The project will replace the asphalt surface, replace all the curbs, and replace the sidewalk along the east side of Nall Avenue. The sidewalk on the west will be repaired as necessary. The curb on the east side of the road is moving two feet closer to the sidewalk to allow for the possibility of changing this section of Nall Avenue to a three lane road in the future.
- 3. 2010-2011 Street Resurfacing Program focuses on repairing existing streets throughout Prairie Village. Every street is evaluated based on its existing condition and given a numerical rating. The rating is derived from formulas that take into account the amount and type of distresses in the existing asphalt pavement. Existing asphalt pavement will either be reconstructed at full depth or milled and resurfaced within 2 to 31/2 inches of Check out the Construction Update Report at www.pvkansas.com/construction for a list of potential streets.

- 4. 2011 Concrete Repair Program includes the replacement of existing damaged or deteriorated concrete curb, sidewalk and ADA (American's with Disabilities Act) pedestrian sidewalk ramps.
- 5. 2011 Crack Seal / Slurry Seal Program focuses on seal coat asphalt pavement and filling cracks as necessary. A slurry seal is a mixture of emulsified (liquid-like) asphalt, aggregate, cement and water that is applied in a very thin coat as a maintenance tool to assist in preserving the existing asphalt pavement. The material cures by the water evaporating out of the mixture. It helps seal the existing surface and has a life span of approximately seven years. It is not considered a substitute for reconstructing or resurfacing the street but is a less costly solution to prolong the existing pavement until major work is necessary and as funding becomes available. Crack seal is a hot applied flexible rubberized sealant used to seal cracks in the pavement to prevent water from entering the base and subbase. Sealing cracks and joints extends the service life of the pavement.

Residents will be notified with a letter approximately two weeks in advance for street closures. A door hanger will also be distributed approximately 48 hours in advance of any street work requiring the loss of access to a driveway.

#### Three major construction projects were completed this year.

- 1. Nall Avenue from 63rd Street to 67th Street was a joint project with the City of Mission and Johnson County to replace curbs and streets. The project also included a one-mile trail and a change from a four lane to three lane street. Paving is complete and sodding and traffic signal work remains.
- 2. Franklin Park Improvements have been completed and the new park shelter is available for use. The improvements included the widening of the park trail to 8', additional parking, the addition of a new park shelter, restroom facilities and nature-play elements that allow children of all ages to interact with their natural surroundings. Visit the park at Somerset Drive and Roe Avenue.
- 3. Somerset Drive from Roe Avenue to Reinhardt Lane included narrowing the existing 4 to 5-lane street section to a 3 to 4-lane section from 83rd Street to Reinhardt Drive, replacing

curb and gutter, a 2-inch mill and overlay of the pavement and pavement marking and signing. The project also included an 8' wide sidewalk from Roe Avenue to Mission Road. The paving and marking has been completed and sodding remains. The project will be finalized this fall.

### PUBLIC SAFETY

Over the last several months there has been an increase in the theft of valuables from vehicles in Prairie Village. We have several reports this year of valuable items stolen overnight from vehicles in driveways and on the street. There are no specific types of vehicles targeted, except that most of them have valuable items inside or are unlocked. Items taken from inside the vehicle are typically small electronics (iPods, GPS, cell phones, laptops, etc).

To help prevent these types of thefts in the future, follow these simple tips.

- Park vehicles in the garage. If you must park in the driveway, keep the vehicle well lit so neighbors and officers would be able to see anyone around the vehicle.
- Do not leave any valuables in your vehicle overnight. If you
  must leave items in the vehicle, lock them in the trunk or
  glovebox out of sight.
- Record serial numbers of your valuables, including the stereo, and keep the numbers in a safe place (not in the vehicle).
- Lock vehicles when you leave them. If you get in the habit of doing it every time, you will not forget to do it overnight.
- Be aware of strange people or vehicles in your neighborhood.



• Do not hesitate to call 911 or the non-emergency Police line (913-642-5151) immediately if you see or hear anything suspicious in your neighborhood.
