The Mayor's Holiday Tree is lit each year to serve as a reminder of our Prairie Village community members in need. Money raised at this time goes to the Mayor's Holiday Tree

Fund, which directly helps deserving and qualified Prairie Village residents with utility assistance, home maintenance needs and food assistance throughout the year. The City works with Johnson County Human Services and Heartland Habitat for Humanity to pinpoint specific necessities. These necessities may be paying an electric, gas or water bill when a resident simply cannot. Or, perhaps it is receiving assistance with an electrical or nagging plumbing problem. Aid might also be in the form of repairing windows and doors or receiving a fresh coat of exterior paint for the home. In 2012, Prairie Village provided \$3,981.20 towards utility assistance. We are on track to do about the same in 2013.

Clean up Yard Waste

Time to rake those leaves! When the trees change colors and the leaves fall to the ground, keeping your yard clean can be a nuisance and expensive. Fortunately, the City of Prairie Village and Deffenbaugh try to make this autumn task a little bit easier.

During November residents are allowed to set out 12 yard waste items per week. Please place yard waste in a biodegradable paper bag or a 35 gallon or less rigid container. A standard bundle of 4 feet in length and 18 inches in circumference is also permitted. Extra containers/bags may be set out, but require an overflow sticker at a cost of \$1.25 per item.

2014 Prairie Village Budget

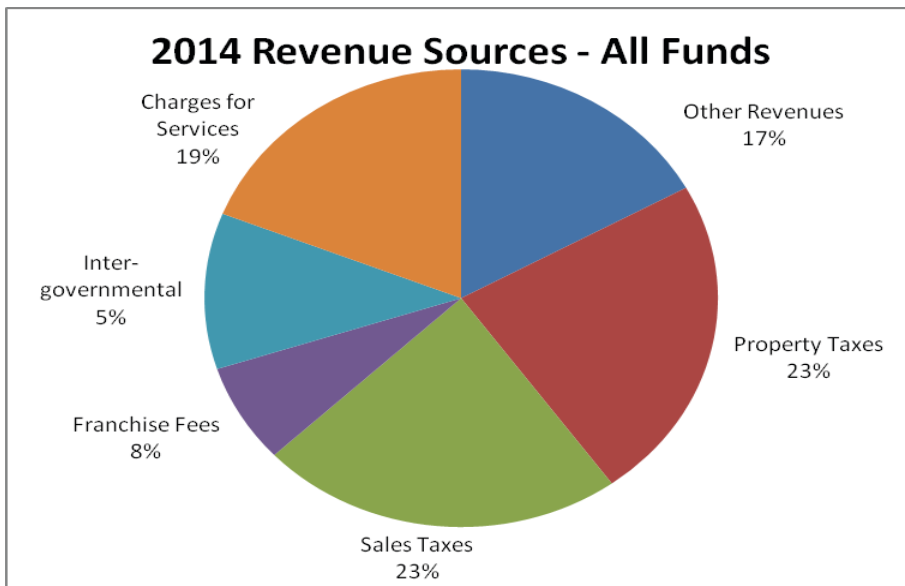

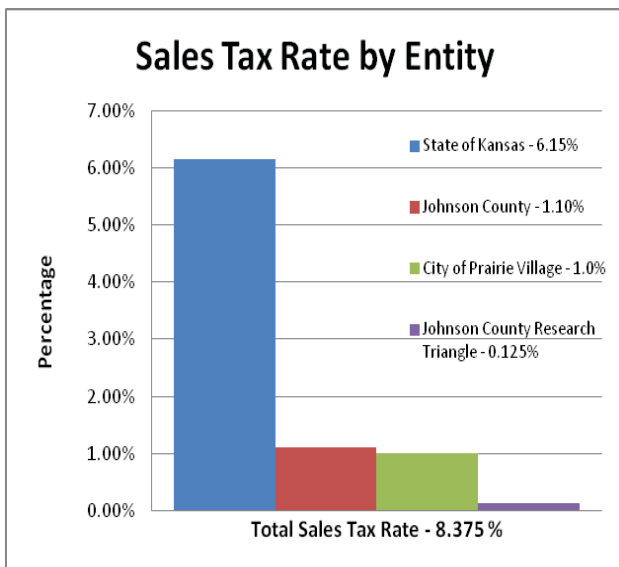

Sales Tax Rate by Entity



Property Tax: Tax on real estate and personal property. It is computed by applying the City's mill rate to the County's assessed valuation.

Sales Tax: Tax comes from two sources: Local Sales Tax and County Sales Tax.

Franchise Fees: Franchise fees are charged on major utilities within the City. The fee is 5% of gross receipts as defined and permitted by state statutes.

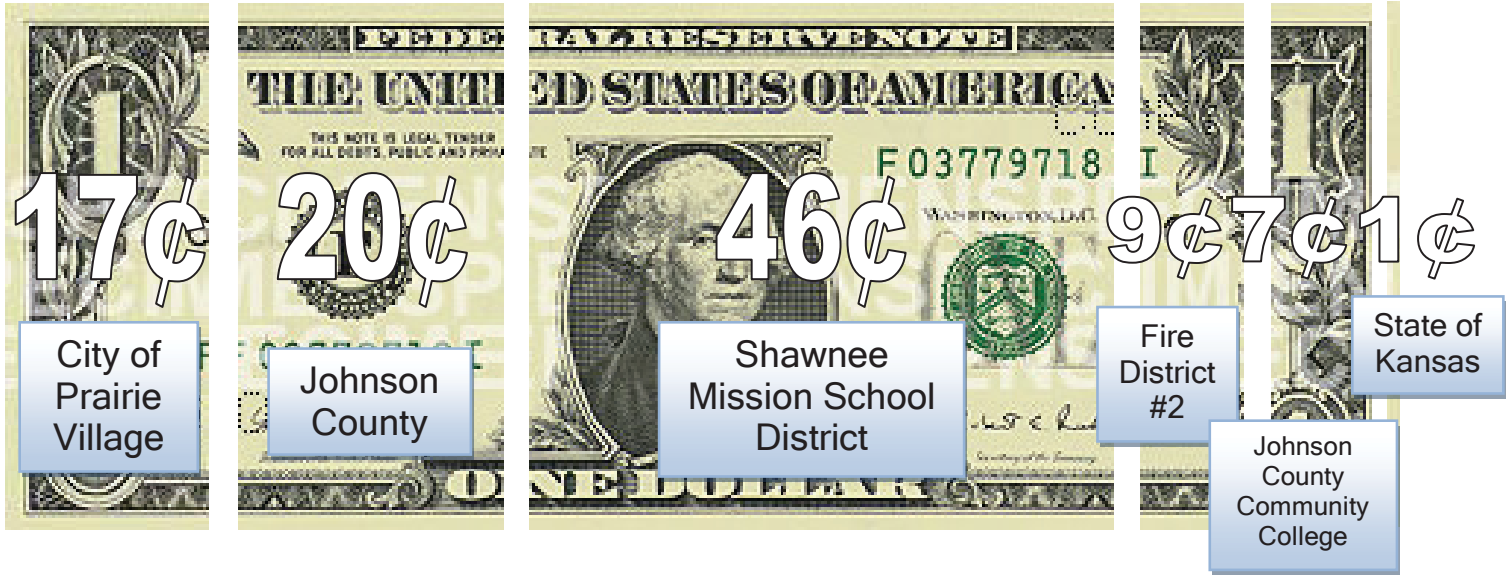
Charges for Services: Includes revenue which is a charge for contract services and special assessments to recipients of certain services.

Intergovernmental: Includes revenues provided by other jurisdictions, primarily the State and Federal governments.

Other Revenues: Includes use tax, motor vehicle tax, liquor tax, license & permits, recreation fees, fines, interest income and miscellaneous revenue.

How are your property taxes used?

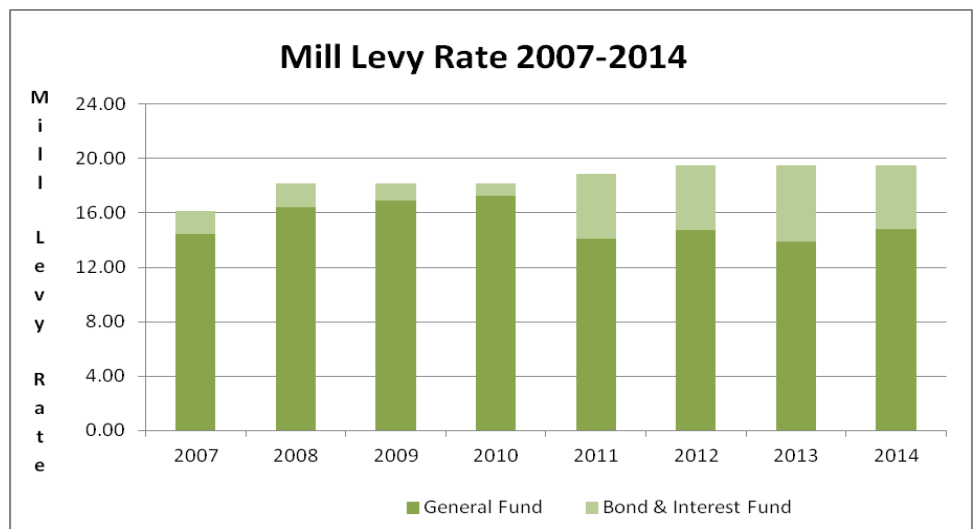


Your property tax bill is divided between several entities of which the City is only 17%

How is the Mill Levy used?

The Mill Levy Rate is applied to the assessed valuation for your property.

The 2014 budget does not include a mill levy rate increase. The mill levy rate was last increased in 2012 by 0.6 mills.

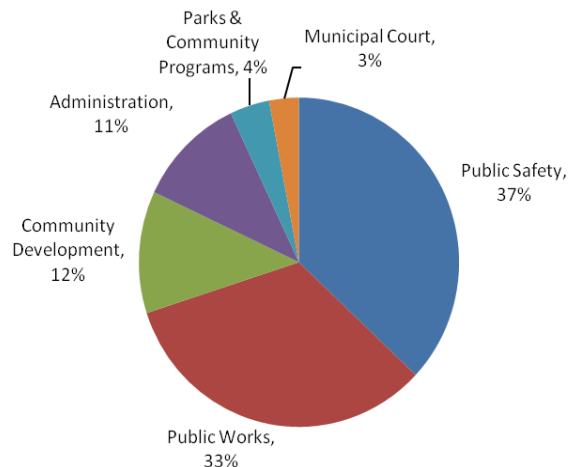

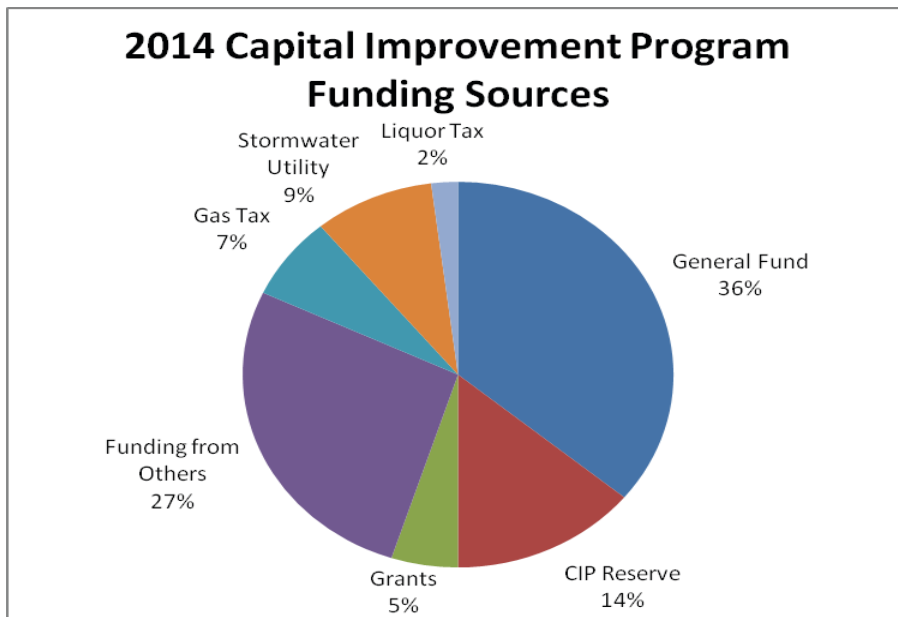

Capital Infrastructure Program

The City maintains a four-year Capital Infrastructure Program (CIP) to aid the City Council and staff in planning and budgeting for the City's infrastructure needs. The CIP is reviewed and updated each year during the budget process. The majority of the funding for the CIP comes from the General Fund. Other funding sources include bond proceeds, the gas tax, the stormwater utility fee, grants, participation by neighboring cities and 1/3 of the liquor tax which is required to be spent on parks and recreation programs.



The CIP is divided into five sections.

Parks

Includes plans for redevelopment and replacement of existing park structures and materials.

Drainage

Includes plans for replacement of components of the City's storm drainage system.

Streets

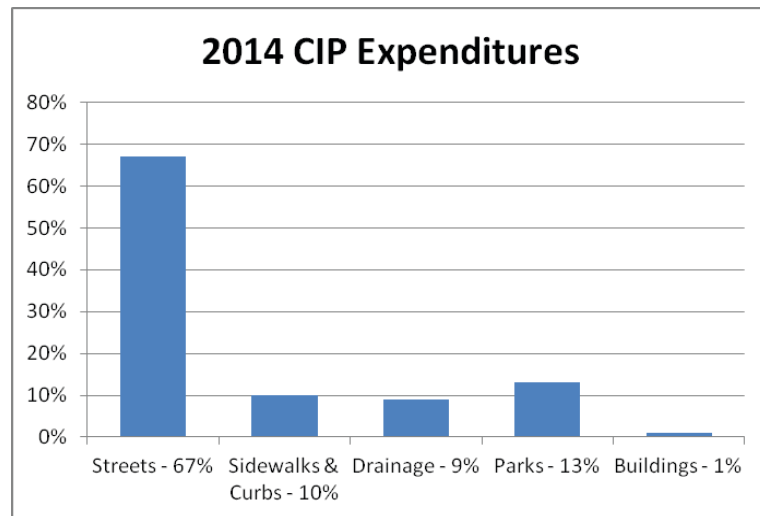
Includes plans for replacement of major improvements that extend the life of the City's street system.

Buildings

Includes plans for replacement or major improvements that extend the life of the City's buildings.

Sidewalks & Curbs

Includes plans for replacement or major improvements that extend the life of the City's sidewalk and curb system. Also includes plans for additions to the system to comply with the City's sidewalk policy or ADA regulations.



PROJECT UPDATES

Update on Prairie Village Shops Project

Improvements are underway at the Prairie Village Shopping Center. Construction of the New Retail Building (Project F) has begun at the former Waid's site. Substantial completion of the new retail building and delivery to the respective tenants is anticipated for mid-January 2014. Starbucks is anticipated to open in their new building sometime in April 2014.

Originally the new retail building and the Mission Lane Improvements (Project A) were anticipated to be completed in 2013. Due to unforeseen delays and approaching winter weather, it will not be possible to complete both projects in 2013. It is anticipated that the Mission Lane Improvements will commence in March 2014 (dependent on weather) and be completed by September 2014. For more information, visit www.pvkansas.com/projects.

Update on Mission Chateau

The City Council met on Tuesday, September 3rd at Village Presbyterian Church to consider the Special Use Permit for the Mission Chateau Project at 8500 Mission Rd. After 5 ½ hours of presentations, public comments, and deliberation, a motion was made to approve the recommendation of the Planning Commission and adopt Ordinance 2294 approving the Special Use Permit for Adult Senior Dwellings at 8500 Mission Rd. The Council voted 7-6 in favor of the project. However, due to the valid protest petition submitted, the motion needed 10 affirmative votes to approve the application. The Special Use Permit was not approved.

On October 4th, Tuteru submitted revised plans for a Special Use Permit for a Senior Living Community. The revised plans call for single-family homes instead of villas and for a re-plot of the site. The Public Hearing will be held at the Tuesday, November 5th Planning Commission Meeting at 7 pm at Village Presbyterian Church, 6641 Mission Rd. Update on Google Fiber Service

The City Council approved agreements with Google in August 2013 to enable a fiber network in Prairie Village. Google Fiber held a Community Information meeting on Monday, September 23rd at the Google Fiber Space. Approximately 100 residents had the opportunity to learn more about the Google Fiber service and products. Google Fiber has not established a timeline for build out in Prairie Village but stated the build outs in other cities (i.e. Austin, TX and Provo, UT) will not affect the timeline in the Kansas City area.

Currently, Google Fiber is in the process of network design. The “fiberhood” sign-up method that was used in Kansas City, KS and Kansas City, MO will be used in other communities including Prairie Village. Interested residents are encouraged to sign-up at fiber.google.com and will be included in the “fiberhoods” once they are open. Early registrants will affect the timeline. Multi-tenant buildings need to execute their own agreement with Google Fiber. At this time, service is available to residential properties only. Home-based businesses may use Google Fiber but are subject to certain conditions. There are three different service plans: Free Internet, Gigabit Internet and Gigabit Internet + TV. PUBLIC SAFETY

Winter Crime Prevention Tips

Wintertime presents some new challenges to protect yourself and your property. Here are several tips to keep yourself safe this season.

- Keep presents away from windows and keep your blinds closed so no one can see the presents in your home.
- Lock your doors and windows at all times even if you are away for only a few minutes.
- Do not open the door to anyone you do not know and trust.
- Use security lights to help light the outside and warn away intruders. Use lights on a timer to make it appear someone is home at night.
- When vacationing, hold the newspaper, mail and any other regular deliveries to your home.
- Set timers on lights, radios, or TVs to give the appearance that someone is home.
- Sign up for a house watch on your residence at www.pvkansas.com.
- Do not post your travel plans on social networking sites like Facebook, MySpace, or Twitter.
- Ask a neighbor to make tire tracks in the driveway when it snows to give the appearance someone is home.
- When shopping, do not leave your handbag or wallet unattended or in the shopping cart; it can be stolen very quickly.
- Pay attention when walking in parking lots, especially when talking on your cell phone, and walk facing traffic.
- Keep valuable items out of sight in your vehicle, put them in the trunk or hidden under a seat. Do not leave any trace of navigation systems like cords, cradles, and ring marks.
- When you take the trash out after the holidays, avoid taking product boxes out to the curb. Leaving a TV, Wii, computer, or laptop box on the curb tells everyone who drives by what there is to steal in your home.

Conceal Carry in City Buildings Update on Kansas House Bill 2052

The City has received inquiries concerning the ability to carry concealed handguns in City buildings by those licensed pursuant to the Personal and Family Protection Act. In a layman's perspective, this bill really boils down to two options for the city to consider:

- 1) Remove concealed carry signs and allow licensed individuals to carry concealed handguns in municipal buildings; or
- 2) Prohibit concealed carry by establishing a "security plan" and adopting a resolution to qualify for a 4-year exemption.

Elected Officials have adopted a resolution to continue prohibiting concealed carry in all municipal buildings and have directed the Chief of Police to develop a security plan that meets specific requirements pursuant to HB 2052 prior to January 1, 2014.

Starting in 2014, all Americans will be required to have health insurance. The Marketplace is a new way to find health coverage that fits your budget and meets your needs. The Health Insurance Marketplace website, www.HealthCare.gov simplifies your search for health coverage by gathering the options available in your area in one place. You can compare plans based on price, benefits, quality, and other features important to you before making a choice.

Open enrollment began October 1, 2013 and ends March 31, 2014. Plans and prices became available on October 1, 2013. You can sign up for an account and begin shopping. Coverage starts as soon as January 1, 2014 if you have enrolled by December 15, 2013.

If you decide to apply, it will be helpful to have the following close by:

- Social Security Numbers
- Birth Dates
- Pay stubs, W-2 forms, or “Wage and Tax Statements”
- Policy numbers for any current health insurance
- Information about any health insurance you or your family could get from your employment
