MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Hello Prairie Village Residents!

On April 7, 2015, I was honored to be elected as the eleventh Mayor of Prairie Village. I've had the pleasure of serving on the City Council as the Ward 4 representative for 17 years and I'm thrilled and grateful to continue my service to Prairie Village as Mayor.

I moved to Prairie Village in 1993 for many of the same reasons that fellow residents do—excellent schools and parks for my children, beautiful neighborhoods, low crime rate, and convenience to local amenities. Over twenty years later the quality of life in Prairie Village remains high. As your Mayor, I remain committed to working with residents, business owners and the City to keep Prairie Village a special place.

In my new role, I have been working with my fellow elected officials, city staff, and volunteers to streamline internal processes and to set priorities. We are currently working to establish our 2016 budget, with the goal of providing the high level of city services you have come to expect at the best possible value.

I believe one of the City's primary goals should also be to ensure we are adequately funding aging infrastructure, especially our streets. More than 20% of our neighborhood streets are rated in fair and poor condition. Delaying maintenance will cost taxpayers 4-5 times more in the long run, so the City must stay ahead of the deterioration rate as much as possible. The 75th Street improvements currently underway are a prime example of making necessary updates while improving pedestrian thoroughfares and connectivity. Other immediate priorities include the development of Meadowbrook Park and preparing the city for Google Fiber and AT&T GigaPower. As always, Council decisions must be based on strong fiscal management, high principles, and input from our citizens.

I look forward to serving you over the next four years. Thank you for your support!


2015 Budget Hearing

Election Results

The spring general election took place on Tuesday, April 7. Laura Wassmer ran unopposed and was elected as Mayor. She was sworn in at the April 20, 2015 City Council meeting.



Ward 4 Appointment

Sheila Myers was appointed by Mayor Laura Wassmer, and confirmed by the city council, to fill the vacant Ward 4 city council seat. The term expires in 2018. Myers has lived in Prairie Village for 18 years and has served as a volunteer on the Community Garden Committee, as well as many other community organizations.

Truck Route Ordinance Update

Recently the ordinance regulating truck traffic in Prairie Village was updated to better accommodate current vehicle standards. Prior to this update any vehicle designed to carry more than 1,500 pounds of cargo was required to remain on designated truck routes within the City. Anything larger than a Ford Ranger pick-up fell into this category! Here is a summary of the new definitions (11-701) and regulation (11-706):

- "Bus" shall mean a motor vehicle designed or used to carry 10 or more passengers, other than vehicles commonly referred to as passenger vans, full size vans or minivans.
- "Commercial vehicle" shall mean any motor vehicle other than bus or a passenger vehicle (as each is defined in this article) or a recreational vehicle (as defined in Section 11-1501 of Article 15 of this Chapter).
- "Passenger vehicle" means a motor vehicle designed primarily for the transportation of people as opposed to equipment, freight or other vehicles, and sold primarily to individuals for personal use, and includes cars, except as excluded below, vehicles commonly referred to as passenger vans, full size vans or minivans (whether or not seats have been removed to allow the carrying of cargo), and, except as excluded below, vehicles commonly referred to as pickup trucks.
- A motor vehicle shall not be excluded from the definition of "passenger vehicle" because such vehicle is carrying items commonly found in residential areas, such as ladders, saw horses, or building materials, or because accessories, such as racks, storage boxes or shells have been added to the vehicle, provided that the original exterior walls of the vehicle remain intact.
- The following vehicles are excluded from the term "passenger vehicle":
 - a. Pickup trucks that do not have the traditional pickup bed and side walls;
 - b. Vans that have extended height or width and are primarily designed to carry cargo instead of passengers;
 - c. Vehicles with aerial buckets or platforms (e.g. "cherry pickers"), welding equipment, mechanical lifts or arms designed to assist in loading and unloading freight; and
 - d. Vehicles commonly referred to as step vans, box vans, flatbed trucks, buses, as defined in this article, semi-tractors and trailers, former military vehicles, cement mixers, construction equipment, and any vehicle with dual rear axles.
- "Truck" means any bus or commercial vehicle as defined in this article.
- No truck as defined in section 11-701 of this article (except those owned and/or operated by the City, emergency vehicles, or those operated by public utilities and engaged in repair, maintenance or construction of utilities, and buses picking up and dropping off passengers in residential areas) shall be allowed to enter upon any of the streets of the city except the following named streets:

75th Street:

95th Street;

Nall Avenue:

State Line from 75th Street to 79th Street:

Mission Road from Tomahawk to 95th Street;

provided, that at the time of any alleged violation of these restrictions, there shall be posted upon the streets of the city, signs indicating streets which allow truck traffic. Trucks delivering or receiving goods or merchandise to or from any house or premises within the city shall be permitted to enter thereon while delivering the goods or merchandise, provided that the trucks travel as close to their destination point as is reasonably possible on the closest designated truck route, then from that truck route using the most direct route to the point of pick up or delivery and shall return to the nearest designated truck route after the delivery as is reasonably possible.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Help Keep Our Village Beautiful!

We're working to keep our community beautiful in 2015 by encouraging good property maintenance practices citywide. Our Code Enforcement Team will be in your neighborhood in the coming weeks looking for common code violations. Below are a few tips to help you keep our village beautiful. Exterior Home Maintenance

- All exterior surfaces (such as walls, fences, etc.) free of damage, decaying paint, rust, etc.
- All sidewalks, walkways, and driveways should be in good repair
- Roof and flashing should be sound and tight
- No broken windows, doors, or gutters

Trash Storage

Trash cans must be stored behind the front building line and screened from view from the street at all times, except the evening before the day of their scheduled trash collection. Here is an example of how one Prairie Village homeowner screens their trash cans.



Assistance for Homeowners


Springtime programs, such as the annual exterior grant and large item trash pickup, have already passed. However, resources are still available to help homeowners meet the city's appearance and maintenance requirements. Johnson County Housing Services administers two programs for low-income homeowners, the HOME Program and the Minor Home Rehabilitation Program. Contact Johnson County Housing Services to see if you qualify and apply for the program at 913-715-6616. City code enforcement staff can also refer qualified homeowners to A Brush with Kindness, a Heartland Habitat for Humanity program that matches community volunteers with homeowners who need help with exterior upkeep.

Yard Upkeep

- Weeds and grass trimmed to less than 8" high
- Remove dead plants, leaves and limb debris
- Remove trash and worthless items accumulating outside

Storage

- Yard tools and equipment, lumber, and other items must be inside or screened in back yard
- No inoperable or unlicensed vehicles outside
- No recreational vehicles stored in front yard

City of Prairie Village's Cost-Share Reimbursement Program

The City of Prairie Village has once again received a grant in the amount of \$5,000 from Johnson County for the Stormwater Treatment Facilities (STF) cost-share program. This program is an innovative approach to controlling stormwater thus improving water quality and aiding in reducing erosion. The program also encourages residents and businesses to plant native plantings that are indigenous to our region.

Individual homeowners and businesses that would be interested in incorporating STFs on their property can find the application forms and additional information about the program on the City's website. The program runs from April 1st to October 31st 2015. Funding is available on a first come, first served basis and is subject to applicable laws and provisions including but not limited to the City of Prairie Village Municipal Code. A homeowner or business is allowed to apply for one STF in a calendar year. Please see Program Requirements on the City's website for additional information.
