Dear Prairie Village residents—

While the typical "park season" is winding down, there will be quite a bit of action happening behind this scenes this winter to strengthen our park system.

The next year will bring significant changes to the corner of 67th Street and Roe Avenue. At

the time of this publication, the City plans to close on the Faith Lutheran Church property on October 31. Following closing, the City will solicit bids for demolition of the building and begin the public process for input on park amenities. Look for more information on that public process coming soon!

The City is also seeking resident feedback on the Harmon and Santa Fe Parks master plan. I hope you can make time to attend one of our open houses scheduled in mid-November; your input on this project is extremely valuable. Please see page 3 of this newsletter for more information.

# **PV HAPPENINGS**

## **Preventing Contamination in Recycled Materials**

According to Republic Services, Prairie Village is one of their cleanest recyclers, with only a 10 to 12 percent rejection rate for our recycled materials due to contamination. With your help in reducing contaminants in the recycled materials, we can make that rate even lower. Contamination of recycled materials can be a big problem, particularly in the single-stream recycling provided in Prairie Village. According to a 2014 EPA webinar, an average of over 16 percent and up to 50 percent of materials (by weight) submitted for recycling may be rejected, and contamination costs an average of \$140 per ton.

Contamination of recycling materials is caused when the wrong things are put into the recycling system (hoses, propane tanks, etc.) or when the right materials are prepared the wrong way (recyclables in plastic bags, food left in containers). Problems include:

- Landfill disposal of materials that could have been recycled
- Worker injury
- Equipment damage
- Increased labor costs
- Loss of revenue for the recycler

The profitability of recycling in general has gone down and the cost has gone up due to reduced international demand for some recycled items (newspaper and cardboard), the low cost of petroleum products that are used to produce new plastic, and production of new products that require less recyclable material (e.g., thinner plastic bottles). Contamination of recyclable materials increases the cost even further. These costs are ultimately passed on to Prairie Village, so it is to our benefit to minimize the contamination costs that we can control.

#### Items that cannot be recycled curbside in Prairie Village include:

#### There are other trends that should be considered:


- Many containers are made up of multiple plastics. For instance, the body of a plastic water bottle is #1 plastic, while the lid and connector are #5. That means that if the lid and connector are not removed, the bottle is recycled as a blended plastic, which has a lesser value.
- Many containers are made up of multiple materials. For example, a prepared food may have a Styrofoam body, foil seal, and plastic cover. These cannot be recycled.
- Some prepared food is being provided in blended material containers, an example being replacement of soup cans with blended foil/plastic packages. The new blended containers cannot be recycled.

  Suggestions from Republic Services:
  - Think before you toss! See guidelines above.
- Try to put all materials in or on top of the bin. If you have extra cardboard boxes, deconstruct them and place them in the container or flat on the top of the container. If you do have things for recycling that don't fit in the bin, bag them and clearly label the bags for recycling. Otherwise they will be collected as trash.

## 2018 Prairie Village Budget

The annual budget serves as a financial plan, provides guidance to City staff and communicates the City's financial condition. Most importantly, it presents the Governing Body's vision for the community by describing how public funds will be spent in order to achieve policy objectives.

**Property Tax:** Tax on real estate and personal property. It is computed by applying the City's mill rate to the County's assessed valuation.

**Sales Tax:** Tax comes from two sources: Local Sales Tax and County Sales Tax.


**Franchise Fees:** Franchise fees are charged on major utilities within the City. The fee is 5% of gross receipts as defined and permitted by state statutes.

Charges for Services: Includes revenue which is a charge for contract services and special assessments to recipients of certain services.

**Intergovernmental:** Includes revenues provided by other jurisdictions, primarily the State and Federal governments.


Other Revenues: Includes use tax, motor vehicle tax, liquor tax, license & permits, recreation fees, fines, interest income and miscellaneous revenue.

## How are your property taxes used?








Your property tax bill is divided between several entities of which the City is only 16%

The 2018 budget does not include a mill levy rate increase. The mill levy rate was last increased in 2012 by 0.6 mills.

#### What services are provided by City Programs?

**Public Safety:** Animal Control, Crime Prevention, Patrol, Investigations, DARE and Emergency Services, Information Technology




### 2018 Budget by Department



## Capital Infrastructure Program

The City maintains a four-year **Capital Infrastructure Program (CIP**) to aid the City Council and staff in planning and budgeting for the City's infrastructure needs. The CIP is reviewed and updated each year during the budget process. The majority of the funding for the CIP comes from the General Fund. Other funding sources include bond proceeds, the gas tax, the stormwater utility fee, grants, participation by neighboring cities and 1/3 of the liquor tax which is required to be spent on parks and recreation programs.

#### The CIP is divided into five sections:

**Parks:** Includes plans for redevelopment and replacement of existing park structures and materials.


**Drainage:** Includes plans for replacement of components of the City's storm drainage system.

**Streets:** Includes plans for major improvements that extend the life of the City's street system.

**Buildings:** Includes plans for replacement or major improvements that extend the life of the City's buildings.

**Sidewalks & Curbs:** Includes plans for replacement or major improvements that extend the life of the City's sidewalk and curb system. Also includes plans for additions to the system to comply with the City's sidewalk policy or ADA regulations.

## Prairie Village Police Department Implements a New Bicycle Unit

Our officers attended and successfully completed the required training with the International Police Mountain Bike Association this summer. ### **Emergency Management Tips: Why Prepare For Disaster?**

The second part of our seven part series covers how you can put together your own Disaster Supply Kit. Having this prepared before the disaster strikes could be very beneficial to you and your family. It ensures that you will have the necessary supplies no matter how fast you may need to evacuate. Many of us have children who have left over backpacks after school lets out for the summer. Use these backpacks and duffel bags to store your Disaster Supply Kit in. Your Supply Kit will also come in handy if you must take shelter in your home during an emergency. The following is a list that will help ensure that your Disaster Supply Kit includes all the essentials.

#### WATER

- Pack at least one gallon per person per day for at least three days.
- Store water in tightly sealed, non-breakable plastic, fiberglass or enamel lined metal containers.
- Change your water every six months.

#### **FOOD**

- Pack enough food to last each family member at least three days.
- Include canned and boxed foods because they require little preparation and stay good for long periods of time.
- Manual can opener or to buy food in self-opening cans.
- Pack foods in sealed metal or plastic containers.
- Replace foods every six months
- Include foods for infants and family members with special diets.

#### TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT

- Battery powered radio
- Flashlights
- · Spare batteries
- Resalable plastic bags
- · Washcloths and towels
- Paper cups, plates and plastic utensils
- Heavy duty plastic garbage bags
- Blankets or a sleeping bag

#### **PERSONAL ITEMS**

- Personal identification
- Copies of birth certificates, marriage license, bank account numbers and any other important documents that if lost would be difficult to replace quickly
- Extra car and house keys
- Prescription medications

## **Construction Projects Continue Into the Fall**

#### Mission Road: 79th to 84th



Be alert during their work hours of 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., as the contractor will have changing traffic patterns to address these items.

### 2017 Paving Program:

There are a few remaining streets to be milled and overlaid this year. Please check the website for updates on these streets. Streets are added or removed based on budget.

#### 2017 Drainage Improvements Program:

There will be winter work on the drainage improvements program. These are isolated repairs on concrete channels in the City. Please check the website for updates on the channel improvements.
