

Replacing your Driveway? Information you Need to Know

Are you thinking about replacing your driveway? If so, here is a reminder of what the City requirements are:

- The Public Works Department requires that any work in the City right-of-way requires a Right-Of-Way Permit. The City right-of-way area is typically 10 to 12 foot from the back of the curb.
- The Contractor that you have hired needs to obtain the Right-Of-Way Permit and meet the permit requirements as stated in the City's Right-of-Way Ordinance. Please make sure your contractor obtains this permit prior to beginning work on your driveway.
- The City Ordinance requires that residential driveway entrances be no wider than 22 feet (not including the wings) and that the driveway entrance should be at least 2 feet from the adjoining property line.
- The City also has specifications on the requirements for the right-of-way portion of your driveway.
- If you want to vary the right-of-way portion of your driveway from the City specifications then you must get approval from the Public Works Department and also sign a driveway variance waiver.

Note that Right-of-Way Permits are required for any work in the City right-of-way, which includes but is not limited to:

- Irrigation System Installation
- Landscaping

• Tree Planting

• Electric Underground Fences

• Utility Work

• Driveways

Stormwater Management What You Can Do

Can You Help? Yes! You can be a stormwater steward. That means in simple, every day activities, like bagging your pet's waste or taking your car to a commercial wash, you can help keep harmful pollutants out of our waterways.

How to Prevent Stormwater Pollution:

- Use fewer lawn chemicals and don't water right away. Try using compost instead of chemical fertilizer. Don't water after applying lawn chemicals and don't apply them before a heavy rainfall is predicted.
- Clean up after your pets. Carry disposable bags while walking your dog so you can pick up and dispose of pet waste in the trash. In your own yard, pick up pet waste, bag it and put it in the trash. Leaving it in the grass sends unsafe bacteria into the storm drains when it rains.
- Recycle used oil. Find an oil recycling center near your home or work to properly dispose of used oil. Johnson County has more than 30 used-oil recycling sites, such as gas stations, automotive supply stores and lubrication service centers. For a list of sites, go to www.recyclespot.org
- Sweep driveways and sidewalks rather than washing them off with the hose. Remove grass clippings, dirt and other debris and dispose of it properly.
- Use a commercial car wash to minimize the effects on the environment. If you wash your car at home, do it on the grass. Use biodegradable, phosphate-free, water-based cleaners only. Use a spray nozzle to save water.
- Properly dispose of trash and yard waste.
- Use household products as directed. Properly store and dispose of all hazardous household products at a hazardous waste facility permitted facility.
- Shop smart. Purchase and use nontoxic, biodegradable, recycled and recyclable products whenever possible.
- Reduce stormwater runoff from your home by installing a rain garden.

Yard Waste Management Frequently Asked Questions

Is it okay to put leaves or grass clippings in the storm drain?

No! It is illegal to dump anything, other than clean water, into the storm drain. Not only is it bad for water quality because stormwater is not treated, it can cause clogs in storm water catch basins which could result in localized street flooding. And this causes increased maintenance costs for the city, which could result in higher taxes for you.

Will mulch moving leaves cause thatch in my lawn?

No! Research has shown that you can mulch up to 6 inches of leaves into your lawn. To do this effectively, it is best to stay ahead of the leaves and not try to mulch 6 inches at once, but mulch frequently throughout the fall season. Also, make sure and have your mower blade sharpened before the fall season to ensure effective mulching. Additionally, thatch is not caused by mulching leaves or grass clippings into your lawn. Thatch is caused by many factors which include, frequent and shallow watering, excessive use of nitrogen fertilizer and pesticides, compacted and poorly aerated soils, and infrequent, high mowing.

Is it OK to blow or rake my leaves or grass clippings into the street-- doesn't the city pick them up?

The City of Prairie Village does not offer a leaf removal service. The street sweepers you may see on your street are there to pick up the leaves that fall on the street and ONLY those leaves that fall on the street. They are not equipped to remove a large amount of leaves, such as those raked intentionally from a yard. Several area Homes Associations have negotiated on behalf of their residents with a thirdparty contractor to provide a fee-based leaf-collection service. Please contact your homes association directly for more information. The City of Prairie Village has weekly curbside yard waste collection, but requires leaves to be in paper bags or in a container clearly marked as yard waste. Up to 12 yard waste items can be put at the curb each week.

Public Works "Touch a Truck" Event - May 23

In celebration of National Public Works Week, Prairie Village Public Works is hosting a "Touch a Truck" event from 4:30 p.m. - 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 23 at their facility located at 3535 Somerset.

City staff will display and demonstrate the wheel loader, skid steer, dump truck, street sweeper, and more. All ages are invited to attend to learn more about Prairie Village Public Works. Enjoy light refreshments and grab a take-home hard hat for the kids!

Police Department Chaplain Program

Johnson County Mental Health Partnership

Johnson County Mental Health (JCMH) and several Northeast Police Departments have partnered together to have a Mental Health professional (Co-Responder) working with them. The Prairie Village Police Department is one of seven agencies sharing this resource. The purpose of the Co-Responder program is to provide a mental health professional to respond alongside officers as they handle calls for service involving individuals dealing with mental health issues.

Taylor Hopkins has been employed as the Northeast Johnson County Mental Health Co-Responder since April 2017. Taylor assists officers by doing assessments on site, as well as continued follow-up



to engage individuals into services to prevent over-utilization of jails and emergency rooms and continued police presence. For the 2017 calendar year, Taylor assisted on 76 calls for service involving mental health consumers in Prairie Village. She assisted with coordination of care for 22 individuals and provided referrals to other social service agencies for 29 individuals. Even in its early stages, the Co-Responder program has proven to be a benefit to both officers and residents of our City.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Help Keep Our Village Beautiful

We're working to keep our community beautiful in 2018 by encouraging good property maintenance practices citywide. Our Code Enforcement Team will be in your neighborhood in the coming weeks looking for common code violations. Below are a few tips to help you keep our village beautiful. Exterior Home Maintenance

- All exterior surfaces (such as walls, fences, etc.) free of damage, decaying paint, rust, etc.
- All sidewalks, walkways, and driveways should be in good repair
- Roof and flashing should be sound and tight
- No broken windows, doors, or gutters

Yard Upkeep

- Weeds and grass trimmed to less than 8" high
- Remove dead plants, leaves and limb debris
- Remove trash and worthless items accumulating outside

Storage

- Yard tools and equipment, lumber, and other items must be inside or screened in back yard
- No inoperable or unlicensed vehicles outside
- No recreational vehicles or trailers stored in front yard and subject to screening requirements.

Trash Storage

Trash carts must be stored behind the front building line and screened from view from the street at all times, except the evening before the day of their scheduled trash collection. Here is an example of how one Prairie Village homeowner screens their trash cans.



Assistance for Homeowners

Springtime programs, such as the annual exterior grant and large item trash pickup, have already passed. However, resources are still available to help homeowners meet the city's appearance and maintenance requirements. Johnson County Housing Services administers two programs for low-income homeowners, the HOME Program and the Minor Home Rehabilitation Program. Contact Johnson County Housing Services at 913-715-6616 to see if you qualify and apply for the program. Qualified homeowners ALSO may participate in "A Brush with Kindness", a Heartland Habitat for Humanity program that matches community volunteers with homeowners who need help with exterior upkeep. Contact Steve Thompson at 816-215-0873 to see if you qualify and to apply for the program.
